LESSON ONE:

WHAT IS HOLINESS?

INTRODUCTION

LESSON FOCUS

This lesson will focus on what it means to be holy. Consider the following questions:

- 1. What does it mean to be "not holy"?
- 2. Why should becoming holy be important to us?

DEFINITIONS:

SAINT - The Greek word for saint is hagioi which means sanctified or holy ones. It comes from the word hagios which means holy.

SANCTIFICATION - The word sanctification comes from the same Greek root as saint and refers to the relationship with God into which men enter by faith in Christ. Sanctification also is used to denote the separation of the believer from evil things and ways. The process of being made holy.

EVIL - corruption of good, whatever is harmful to God's creation. Something is evil because it hurts us or others.

PRAYER

- Pray for understanding and insight into what holiness is and the purpose for it.
- Ask for help in seeing what effect holiness should be having in your life.
- Thank God that he has called you to be holy and that holiness is his will for your life.

SEARCHING THE SCRIPTURES

WHAT IS HOLINESS?

2 Corinthians 6:14 7:1

Do not be yoked together with unbelievers. For what do righteousness and wickedness have in common? Or what fellowship can light have with darkness? What harmony is there between Christ and Belial [Satan]? What does a believer have in common with an unbeliever? What agreement is there between the temple of God and idols? For we are the temple of the living God. As God has said: "I will live with them and walk among them, and I will be their God, and they will be my people." (cont. page)

Therefore come out from them and be separate, says the Lord. Touch no unclean thing, and I will receive you. I will be a Father to you, and you will be my sons and daughters, says the Lord Almighty." Since we have these promises, dear friends, let us purify ourselves from everything that contaminates body and spirit, perfecting holiness out of reverence for God.

THE EQUATION OF HOLINESS:

There are two parts to holiness. Holiness means being separate from evil or corruption but it more profoundly means to be connected with God. Our holiness is a consequence of, and by the virtue of, our being connected with or being consecrated to God.

s_____+ c____= holiness

If we are connected to the world, we take on the nature of the world. If we are connected to God we take on the nature of God. Our holiness is by virtue of our connection to God. We cannot be separate from God and maintain his nature.



ILLUSTRATION: IRON BAR

If you take an iron bar and put it in the freezer, it will take on the characteristic of cold from the freezer. If you put it into a fire, it becomes red as it takes on the heat of the fire. The iron bar cannot be both hot and cold at the same time. Hot and cold are mutually

exclusive properties. You cannot take on the new nature of God if you have been connected to the world and taken on the nature of the world without first separating from the old nature. The two natures are incompatible.

Remember from S.O.S. I that the Bible teaches there are three areas of evil we need to separate from: Satan, the world and the flesh. Separating from which one of these will automatically render the other two powerless? Why?

Which do we usually think of separating ourselves from?

Why?

REMEMBER:

To be made holy we must separate ourselves from our own evil but the essential ingredient of holiness is being connected to God. The purpose of separating from our evil is to connect to God.



ILLUSTRATION: A JOURNEY

If your desire were to take a journey from Los Angeles to New York, you would first have to leave Los Angeles. However, arriving in New York is a more essential or profound part of the journey than leaving Los Angeles. Also, remember if you leave Los Angeles but

don't head in the right direction, you won't get to New York. In that case the act of leaving would be meaningless.

WHAT IS THE NATURE OF THE WORLD?

Colossians 3:58

Put to death whatever belongs to your earthly nature: sexual immorality, impurity, lust, evil desires and greed, which is idolatry. Because of these, the wrath of God is coming. You used to walk in these ways, in the life you once lived. But now you must rid yourself of all such things as these: anger, rage, malice, slander, and filthy language from your lips.

HOW DO WE SEPARATE FROM EVIL?

In this passage, Jesus is addressing the Pharisees, the Jewish religious leaders

Matthew 23:25-28

"Woe to you, teachers of the law and Pharisees, you hypocrites! You clean the outside of the cup and dish, but inside they are full of greed and self indulgence. Blind Pharisee! First clean the inside of the cup and dish, and then the outside also will be clean.

"Woe to you, teachers of the law and Pharisees, you hypocrites! You are like whitewashed tombs, which look beautiful on the outside but on the inside are full of dead men's bones and everything unclean. In the same way, on the outside you appear to people as righteous but on the inside you are full of hypocrisy and wickedness."

Sometimes as Christians we believe we are holy because we have removed ourselves from the contamination of the world without being cleansed of our own evil desires. We have removed the temptation part from the Equation of Sin. (temptation + evil desires =sin) If we are separated from the evil outside but not inside, we are like the Pharisees and become self righteous and legalistic. We become arrogant and don't recognize our vulnerability to sin and temptation.

WHY DOES GOD WANT US TO BE HOLY?

2 Timothy 2:20-21

In a large house there are articles not only of gold and silver, but also of wood and clay; some are for noble purposes and some for ignoble. If a man cleanses himself from the latter, he will be an instrument for noble purposes, made holy, useful to the Master and prepared to do any good work.

OUR CONNECTION TO CHRIST MAKES US USEFUL

John 15:1-6

"I am the true vine, and my Father is the gardener. He cuts off every branch in me that bears no fruit, while every branch that does bear fruit he prunes so that it will be even more fruitful. You are already clean because of the word I have spoken to you. Remain in me, and I will remain in you. No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear fruit unless you remain in me.

I am the vine; you are the branches. If a man remains in me and I in him, he will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing. If anyone does not remain in me, he is like a branch that is thrown away and withers; such branches are picked up, thrown into the fires and burned.

ILLUSTRATION: BROKEN TOOLS

A tool that is broken isn't useful. It needs to be repaired and restored to be productive.

••• **LESSON FOCUS**

This lesson will look more closely at God's part in our holiness and the next lesson will examine our part in becoming holy.

DEFINITIONS OF SALVATION:

JUSTIFICATION - The work of Christ on the cross which takes away the blame of sin. Christ delivered us from the penalty of sin. (This is the legal remedy for sin, which entails a pardon or commuted sentence.)

SANCTIFICATION - The work of the Holy Spirit which makes us holy, sets us apart for holy purposes. The Holy Spirit delivers us from the power of sin. (This is the health remedy for sin, which entails a change of nature.)

PRAYER

- Pray for help in understanding what it means to be made holy.
- Ask for insight into your own need for holiness and dependence on the Holy Spirit.
- Thank Jesus that he died to make us holy.

SEARCHING THE SCRIPTURES

WE ARE MADE PERFECT AND ARE BEING MADE HOLY

Hebrews 10:14

Because by the one sacrifice he has made perfect forever those who are being made holy.

"Made perfect" is *tetlaoken* which means a completely finished, perfect work. "Forever" is *dianekas*, which means continuous, uninterrupted, perpetual, endless, eternal.

- 3. What does it mean then to be made perfect forever?

REMEMBER:

The word tetlaoken (made perfect) is in the perfect tense which means it is a completed, past action that has continuing results into the present. The word hagiazomenous (being made holy) is in the present tense, passive voice, which means that it is an action that is going on right now. It is an incomplete, on going action happening to the saint.

On the cross Christ did a completed work which made us perfect forever in the eyes of God. This is positional holiness, which has delivered us from the penalty of sin. It is referred to as justification. In the meantime the Spirit of Christ is making us holy now. This is the process of becoming holy, the work of the Holy Spirit delivering us from the power of sin. It is referred to as sanctification.

ILLUSTRATION: BLUEPRINT

Before creation God had a blueprint in his mind of what he wanted to do, but he hadn't done it yet. In the same way a person is completely perfect in the mind of God as he is being made holy in Christ.

The construction of a building is started with the building design complete in the mind of the architect; so complete, in fact, he can draw a picture or make a model of the finished product. It is, however, the job of the construction workers to build the actual building to the architect's final design.

ILLUSTRATION: NO WORKERS

An architect's blueprint has already laid out the completed building. The building, however, is being made complete by the work of the construction crews. If there is a strike and the construction workers leave the job site, the work comes to a standstill. As long as they are

off the job the building will never be brought to completion, no matter how complete it is in the mind of the architect. The solution to completing the building is to get the construction crews on the job site and back to work again.

In our Christian life it is the work of the Holy Spirit that is making us holy. If the Holy Spirit is absent then the work comes to a standstill. The solution is to get the Holy Spirit back at work in our life through separation from our own internal evil and connection to God.

Without the Holy Spirit we are without p_____ for life and godliness, without participation in

God's divine n_____, and without ability to separate from our e_____ desires. (2 Peter 1:3-4)

REMEMBER:

We are those who are being made holy only when the Holy Spirit is on the job site. God sees the completed work, even though we are still under construction.

CONCLUDING THOUGHTS

FREED FROM THE LAW OF SIN AND DEATH

Romans 7:21-8:4

²¹ So I find this law at work: When I want to do good, evil is right there with me. ²² For in my inner being I delight in God's law; ²³ but I see another law at work in the members of my body, waging war against the law of my mind and making me a prisoner of the law of sin at work within my members. ²⁴ What a wretched man I am! Who will rescue me from this body of death? ²⁵ Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ our Lord! So then, I myself in my mind am a slave to God's law, but in the sinful nature a slave to the law of sin.

¹ Therefore, there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus, ² because through Christ Jesus the law of the Spirit of life set me free from the law of sin and death. ³ For what the law was powerless to do in that it was weakened by the sinful nature, God did by sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful man to be a sin offering. And so he condemned sin in sinful man, ⁴ in order that the righteous requirements of the law might be fully met in us, who do not live according to the sinful nature but according to the Spirit.





LESSON FOCUS

This lesson will focus on what is our part in becoming holy. Last lesson showed that our holiness is a work of God in us through the justifying work of Jesus Christ on the cross and through the sanctifying work of the Spirit of Christ in us. God gives and we receive. This lesson will examine our part in receiving what God gives.

1. Does everyone receive what God gives?

THE BATTLE TO BELIEVE

God delivered the Israelites from slavery in Egypt. When the Israelites left Egypt they miraculously crossed over two bodies of water to fulfill God's promise:

- RED SEA They left Egypt which was a calling to be separate from the world, evil, etc.
- JORDAN RIVER They entered the Promise Land which was entering into a relationship with God and the blessings of that relationship.

To enter the Promise Land the people of Israel could not possess God's promise until they fought for God's promise. It is easy to de-emphasize the part of Christianity that requires a battle or struggle. As with Israel our possessing God's promise requires a fight. To avoid the battle is to forfeit the prize. If we pursue ease, our destiny will be burden. We need to know that spiritually we are in a time of war and will be either the victor or the vanquished.

- 1. Besides the battle for the Promise Land what personal battle did the Israelites have to fight over and over again?
- 2. How does that relate to our personal battles?



NOTE: The real battle is at the level of belief. Who or what are you going to put your trust or faith in? The Greek word, pistos, is used interchangeably for faith, trust, and belief.

PRAYER

- Pray for help in understanding what it means to be made holy.
- Ask for insight into your own need for holiness and dependence on the Holy Spirit.
- Thank Jesus that he died to make us holy.

Faith in the truth is our part of being connected to God, resulting in living a fruitful, abundant life. Is putting our faith in the truth easy? Explain your answer.

FIGHTING THE FIGHT OF FAITH

1 Timothy 6:12

Fight the good fight of the faith. Take hold of the eternal life to which you were called when you made your good confession in the presence of many witnesses.

- 1. Why does Paul call our struggle a fight of faith?
- 2. What are the three forces of evil opposing our fight of faith?

The stake in the battle is the outcome of our lives as we will become like what we are connected to. We connect to what we put our faith in. We become like what we love. If we connect to a polluted stream, we become polluted. If we are connected to the vine, we become fruitful.

REMEMBER:

Our holiness, our being connected and useful, results from our looking up to God and God filling us up so we can walk up. Our part of holiness is to look up by putting our faith in Christ, by believing the truth. God's part is to fill us up by indwelling our hearts with his Spirit, enabling us to walk up and be fruitful in the way we live. When we look up God fills us up so we can walk up.

EXPERIENCING THE POWER OF OUR FAITH

1 John 5:4-5

⁴for everyone born of God overcomes the world. This is the victory that has overcome the world, even our faith. ⁵Who is it that overcomes the world? Only he who believes that Jesus is the Son of God.

What does that mean?

Hebrews 11:6

And without faith it is impossible to please God, because anyone who comes to him must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who earnestly seek him.

If we believe in Jesus and rely on God, God is faithful to us and we have divine power to overcome and experience his blessing through our connection to him. A man can't fly on his own but he can choose to get on an airplane and be enabled to fly.



ILLUSTRATION: TRUST/ BELIEF

What you put your faith in determines the outcome of the battle. In the battle for the frontier the Indians trusted in their bows and arrows while the settlers trusted in their guns. The settlers dominated because they had more powerful weapons to use.

When we trust in God he is faithful to us and there is nothing that can overpower him. If our trust is in ourselves or someone or something less than God, we are easily overcome by evil and defeated. Our battle is a battle of trust or belief, trusting in the truth of God, the shed blood of Christ and the indwelling Spirit of Christ.

THINKING IT THROUGH

THE EXAMPLE OF ISRAEL

Before Israel was delivered from the captivity of Egypt, Israel did not have a chance to do battle as she was enslaved and completely dominated by the Egyptians. Once God delivered her from slavery, she was told to take possession of the Promise Land. To take possession of the land Israel had to battle for it. As Israel put her faith in God and his promises, she was able to overcome the enemies living in the land. In the same way, before being born again, we were slaves to our sin and our sin completely dominated us. We were not free to battle. Now, however, we are in a battle to acquire the promises of God for our souls. God is the one who enables us to conquer.

- 1. What are the three options for a warrior facing battle?
- 2. What happens if we fail to acknowledge the battle?

In our warfare, our primary battle is against our sinful nature. If we try to fight on our own against our sinful nature, we lose. Our primary war is one against doubt; "Is God working in me and able to give me victory?" As Paul called it in 1 Timothy, it is a "fight of faith." Christians live in captivity to sin because of doubt and lack of faith in God and his truth, not because they are under-powered to have victory.



ILLUSTRATION: WIN THE BATTLE

We lost the Vietnam War, not because we were weak and didn't have enough military power, but because we were unwilling to use the strength we had at our disposal. If we are going to win the battle against Satan, the world, and our flesh, we must trust

in our big weapons: the blood of Christ and the indwelling Spirit of Christ. Our part is to trust God to work in us, and for us to fight the fight of faith and to believe the truth.

REMEMBER:

To become holy in this life and wear a crown in the next, we must fight the battle of faith.

CONCLUDING THOUGHTS

THE EXAMPLE OF PETER BEFORE AND AFTER PENTECOST

Matthew 26:31-35

³¹Then Jesus told them, "This very night you will all fall away on account of me, for it is written:

" 'I will strike the shepherd, and the sheep of the flock will be scattered.' ³²But after I have risen, I will go ahead of you into Galilee."

³³Peter replied, "Even if all fall away on account of you, I never will."

³⁴"I tell you the truth," Jesus answered, "this very night, before the rooster crows, you will disown me three times."

³⁵But Peter declared, "Even if I have to die with you, I will never disown you." And all the other disciples said the same.

Matthew 26:69-75

Now Peter was sitting out in the courtyard, and a servant girl came to him. "You also were with Jesus of Galilee," she said.

⁷⁰But he denied it before them all. "I don't know what you're talking about," he said.

⁷¹Then he went out to the gateway, where another girl saw him and said to the people there, "This fellow was with Jesus of Nazareth."

⁷²He denied it again, with an oath: "I don't know the man!"

⁷³After a little while, those standing there went up to Peter and said, "Surely you are one of them, for your accent gives you away."

⁷⁴Then he began to call down curses on himelf and he swore to them, "I don't know the man!" Immediately a rooster crowed. ⁷⁵Then Peter remembered the word Jesus had spoken:

"Before the rooster crows, you will disown me three times." And he went outside and wept bitterly.

Acts 4:1-22

¹The priests and the captain of the temple guard and the Sadducees came up to Peter and John while they were speaking to the people. ²They were greatly disturbed because the apostles were teaching the people and proclaiming in Jesus the resurrection of the dead. ³They seized Peter and John, and because it was evening, they put them in jail until the next day. ⁴But many who heard the message believed, and the number of men grew to about five thousand.

⁵The next day the rulers, elders and teachers of the law met in Jerusalem.⁶Annas the high priest was there, and so were Caiaphas, John, Alexander and the other men of the high priest's family.

⁷They had Peter and John brought before them and began to question them: "By what power or what name did you do this?"

⁸Then Peter, filled with the Holy Spirit, said to them: "Rulers and elders of the people! ⁹If we are being called to account today for an act of kindness shown to a cripple and are asked how he was healed, ¹⁰then know this, you and all the people of Israel: It is by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom you crucified but whom God raised from the dead, that this man stands before you healed. ¹¹He is "`the stone you builders rejected, which has become the capstone. ¹²Salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given to men by which we must be saved."

¹³When they saw the courage of Peter and John and realized that they were unschooled, ordinary men, they were astonished and they took note that these men had been with Jesus. ¹⁴But since they could see the man who had been healed standing there with them, there was nothing they could say. ¹⁵So they ordered them to withdraw from the Sanhedrin and then conferred together. ¹⁶"What are we going to do with these men?" they asked. "Everybody living in Jerusalem knows they have done an outstanding miracle, and we cannot deny it. ¹⁷But to stop this thing from spreading any further among the people, we must warn these men to speak no longer to anyone in this name."

¹⁸Then they called them in again and commanded them not to speak or teach at all in the name of Jesus. ¹⁹But Peter and John replied, "Judge for yourselves whether it is right in God's sight to obey you rather than God. 20For we cannot help speaking about what we have seen and heard." ²¹After further threats they let them go. They could not decide how to punish them, because all the people were praising God for what had happened. ²²For the man who was miraculously healed was over forty years old.





SEARCHING THE SCRIPTURES

THE FOUNDATION OF HOLINESS

2 Peter 1:3

His divine power has given us everything we need for life and godliness through our knowledge of him who called us by his own glory and goodness.

- 1. What has God's divine power given us?
- 2. What do you think the word godliness means?

The word for godliness is *eusebeian* and it means piety, having a proper attitude or reverence toward God that expresses itself in action. Therefore, it can be stated that God's divine power has given us everything we need for an abundant life and a proper, reverent attitude towards God manifested in action.

3. Going back to the scripture what is the source of our piety (a proper attitude or reverence towards God)?

What is the source of abundant life?

If we have a humble, pious attitude, we have a relationship, a connection to God, and receive what we need for life from God. A plug has to be conformed to the configuration of the outlet in order to receive power. A 220 volt clothes dryer cannot be plugged into a normal outlet. The plug and the outlet must have the same configuration. A pious, submissive attitude toward God conforms us to receive his divine power.

- 4. If everything we need for life and godliness is available through God's divine power, why would we try to get what we need outside of God's divine power?
- 5. According to this verse, how do we receive God's full provision of life and godliness?

The word *epignosko* (complete or full knowledge) does not refer to intellectual knowledge but rather personal, first hand knowledge.

a) Example- How many know of Abraham Lincoln?

How many know him personally?

b) Our personal, first hand knowledge of God comes through our connection with him.

John 14:16-18

His divine power has given us everything we need for life and godliness through our knowledge of him who called us by his own glory and goodness. Through these he has given us his very great and precious promises, so that through them you may participate in the divine nature and escape the corruption in the world caused by evil desires.

6. Through whom do we gain a full, intimate knowledge of Christ?

THE PROGRESSION OF DEPRAVITY

Romans 1:18-32

¹⁸ The wrath of God is being revealed from heaven against all the godlessness and wickedness of men who suppress the truth by their wickedness, ¹⁹ since what may be known about God is plain to them, because God has made it plain to them. ²⁰ For since the creation of the world God's invisible qualities—his eternal power and divine nature—have been clearly seen, being understood from what has been made, so that men are without excuse.

²¹ For although they knew God, they neither glorified him as God nor gave thanks to him, but their thinking became futile and their foolish hearts were darkened. ²² Although they claimed to be wise, they became fools ²³ and exchanged the glory of the immortal God for images made to look like mortal man and birds and animals and reptiles. ²⁴ Therefore God gave them over in the sinful desires of their hearts to sexual impurity for the degrading of their bodies with one another. ²⁵ They exchanged the truth of God for a lie, and worshiped and served created things rather than the Creator—who is forever praised. Amen.

²⁶ Because of this, God gave them over to shameful lusts. Even their women exchanged natural relations for unnatural ones. ²⁷ In the same way the men also abandoned natural relations with women and were inflamed with lust for one another. Men committed indecent acts with other men, and received in themselves the due penalty for their perversion.

²⁸ Furthermore, since they did not think it worthwhile to retain the knowledge of God, he gave them over to a depraved mind, to do what ought not to be done. ²⁹ They have become filled with every kind of wickedness, evil, greed and depravity. They are full of envy, murder, strife, deceit and malice. They are gossips, ³⁰ slanderers, God-haters, insolent, arrogant and boastful; they invent ways of doing evil; they disobey their parents; ³¹ they are senseless, faithless, heartless, ruthless. ³² Although they know God's righteous decree that those who do such things deserve death, they not only continue to do these very things but also approve of those who practice them.

SEARCHING THE SCRIPTURES

THE ESSENCE OF GOD'S HOLY CHARACTER

1 JOHN 4:8

Whoever does not love does not know God, because God is love.

1 John 4:16

And so we know and rely on the love God has for us. God is love. Whoever lives in love lives in God, and God in him.

1. What does the statement "God is love" mean?

God's holy character has many attributes: justice, mercy, wisdom, purity, etc. but none of these can be said to describe the very essence of God. You wouldn't say God is justice. Only love describes the complete essence of God. All other attributes come from his love.

2. What would God's justice be like without love?

3. What would God's mercy be like without love?

4. What would God's purity be like without love?

GOD IS LOVE. All his other attributes are like branches extending from his love. Love is the pre-eminent essence of God's holy character.

THE ESSENCE OF LOVE

1 JOHN 4:8

This is love: not that we loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as an atoning sacrifice for our sins.

If love is the essence of God's holy character, what is the essence of God's love?

Since the essence of God's holy character is love and the essence of God's love is the sacrificial, selfless giving of his Son, then the essence of God's holiness in us is the essence of God's love, sacrificial, selfless giving.

THE ESSENCE OF WICKEDNESS

2 Timothy 3:1-4

But mark this: There will be terrible times in the last days. People will be lovers of themselves, lovers of money, boastful, proud, abusive, disobedient to their parents, ungrateful, unholy, without love, unforgiving, slanderous, without self control, brutal, not lovers of the good, treacherous, rash, conceited, lovers of pleasure rather than lovers of God.

If love is the essence of holiness, what is the essence of wickedness?

THE CALL TO PUT ON LOVE

Colossians 3:12-14

Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience. Bear with each other and forgive whatever grievances you may have against one another. Forgive as the Lord forgave you, and over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity.

1. As God's chosen people what are we?

Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It is not rude, it is not self seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres.






ILLUSTRATION: SELFLESS GIVING

In the 1600s in England, it was illegal to be a Quaker. During an outbreak of the Bubonic Plague, the only people who would tend to the sick were the Quakers. The soldiers would arrest the people who went to help the sick because they knew they could only be

Quakers. This, however, did not stop the Quakers. They were connected to God's love and were able to give selflessly of themselves. This selfless giving had an impact on the life of William Penn and caused him to dedicate his life to God. Penn's family had money and influence and Penn was therefore able to appeal to the king on behalf of the Quakers to gain land for them in America.

THE CONNECTION BETWEEN OUR LOVE AND GOD'S LOVE

The only way we are able to put on love is through increasing holiness through the uncovering of and separation from our own sin (flesh) and through connecting to God's love. From scripture we can know what the actions of real love are. To be able to act in real love we have to be connected to God's divine power. Fill out the PUTTING ON LOVE CHART. The virtues of love come from 1 Corinthians 13:4 7.

CONCLUDING THOUGHTS

THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN LOVE AND GREAT DEEDS

1 Corinthians 13:1-3

If I speak in the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal. If I have the gift of prophecy and can fathom all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have a faith that can move mountains, but have not love, I am nothing. If I give all I possess to the poor and surrender my body to the flames, but have not love, I gain nothing.

Non-Christians often are turned off toward Christianity because of the condemnation they feel coming from Christians. If we focus on the evil of society or what others are doing wrong, then we generally fail to see the evil of our own flesh. The evil of the world will be overcome by us only in the same way Christ ultimately overcame it, through love, the selfless, sacrificial gift of himself. Christ is accessible to us because of his love.

We can only share in the power of Christ's sacrificial love to overcome evil as we increase in holiness, separating ourselves from our own flesh and connecting to God. The best thing we can do for ourselves is to become selfless. We were created to reflect God and be selfless givers.

STEPS TO DEFEATING EVIL

- Take the focus off outside evil.
- Seek to uncover and turn from own sin.
- Connect to God through Christ's love, the sacrificial gift of himself.
- Respond to evil through the selfless giving of increasing holiness.

Colossians 3:1-17

¹ Since, then, you have been raised with Christ, set your hearts on things above, where Christ is seated at the right hand of God. ² Set your minds on things above, not on earthly things. ³ For you died, and your life is now hidden with Christ in God. 4 When Christ, who is your life, appears, then you also will appear with him in glory.

⁵Put to death, therefore, whatever belongs to your earthly nature: sexual immorality, impurity, lust, evil desires and greed, which is idolatry. ⁶Because of these, the wrath of God is coming. ⁷You used to walk in these ways, in the life you once lived. ⁸But now you must rid yourselves of all such things as these: anger, rage, malice, slander, and filthy language from your lips. ⁹Do not lie to each other, since you have taken off your old self with its practices ¹⁰ and have put on the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge in the image of its Creator. ¹¹Here there is no Greek or Jew, circumcised or uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave or free, but Christ is all, and is in all.

¹² Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly love, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience. ¹³ Bear with each other and forgive whatever grievances you may have against one another. Forgive as the Lord forgave you. ¹⁴ And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity.

¹⁵ Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, since as members of one body you were called to peace. And be thankful. ¹⁶ Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom, and as you sing psalms, hymns and spiritual songs with gratitude in your hearts to God, ¹⁷ And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him.

PUT TO DEATH THE EARTHLY NATURE (V. 5)

1. What does it mean to put to death your earthly nature?

2. How does it affect us if we put to death the earthly nature?

EXAMPLE: Ephesus (Acts 19:17-20)

¹⁷When this became known to the Jews and Greeks living in Ephesus, they were all seized with fear, and the name of the Lord Jesus was held in high honor. ¹⁸Many of those who believed now came and openly confessed their evil deeds. ¹⁹A number who had practiced sorcery brought their scrolls together and burned them publicly. When they calculated the value of the scrolls, the total came to fifty thousand drachmas. ²⁰In this way the word of the Lord spread widely and grew in power.

How is this an example of principle two?



PUT ON THE NEW SELF (V. 10) The words "put on" are words of dressing.

1. What does it mean to put on the new self?

2. How does it affect us if we put on the new self?

EXAMPLE: Gaius (3 John 2-4)

²Dear friend, I pray that you may enjoy good health and that all may go well with you, even as your soul is getting along well. ³It gave me great joy to have some brothers come and tell about your faithfulness to the truth and how you continue to walk in the truth. ⁴I have no greater joy than to hear that my children are walking in the truth.

How is this an example of principle three?

PRINCIPLE FOUR

LET THE PEACE OF CHRIST RULE IN YOUR HEART (V. 15)

The word for rule is *brabuo*. It is a sporting term which means the function of an umpire.

1. How can the peace of God rule us in the sense of an umpire?

The presence of peace or the lack of peace should show us whether we are in or out of bounds. When we find ourselves in a situation of conflict without the peace of God we tend to say, "how can I straighten out the other person to regain God's peace?" The correct response is, "How can I regain God's peace by responding in God's will?" It is impossible to have the peace of Christ when we are disobedient to God's truth.

2. How will it affect us if we let the peace of God rule our hearts?

EXAMPLE: David (2 Samuel 24:10)

¹⁰David was conscience-stricken after he had counted the fighting men, and he said to the LORD, "I have sinned greatly in what I have done. Now, O LORD, I beg you, take away the guilt of your servant. I have done a very foolish thing."

How is this an example of principle four?

PRINCIPLE FIVE

LET THE WORD OF CHRIST DWELL IN YOU RICHLY (V. 16)

The same word which means indwelling means residence in a house. The Word of Christ in a limited sense is the teachings of Christ but in a broader sense refers to all of God's truth. The word richly refers to abundantly.

1. What does it mean to let the Word of Christ dwell in us richly?

If the word of Christ dwells in us richly it means the principles that reside in us or have made their home in us are God's truth; as compared to sin living in us which means deception has taken residence.

2. What are we like if the Word of Christ dwells in us abundantly?

EXAMPLE: Fellowship of believers (Acts 2:42 47)

⁴²They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. ⁴³Everyone was filled with awe, and many wonders and miraculous signs were done by the apostles. ⁴⁴All the believers were together and had everything in common. ⁴⁵Selling their possessions and goods, they gave to anyone as he had need. ⁴⁶Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, ⁴⁷praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved.

How is this an example of principle five?



DO EVERYTHING IN THE NAME OF JESUS (V. 17)

EXAMPLE: Peter and John (Acts 4:8-10)

⁸Then Peter, filled with the Holy Spirit, said to them: "Rulers and elders of the people! ⁹If we are being called to account today for an act of kindness shown to a cripple and are asked how he was healed, ¹⁰then know this, you and all the people of Israel: It is by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom you crucified but whom God raised from the dead, that this man stands before you healed.

LESSON FOCUS

In this lesson we will be examining the FRUIT OF THE SPIRIT. The idea is that if we are implementing the RULES FOR HOLY LIVING we should be producing holy fruit in our lives.



ILLUSTRATION: IMPROVING FRUIT

If we have a fruit tree with withered or defective fruit, we try to improve the fruit, not by doing something to the fruit, but by trying to improve the growing conditions, i.e., fertilizing, watering, pruning, etc.

The RULES FOR HOLY LIVING are like preparing the soil, getting rid of pests, watering, etc. If we are living out the RULES FOR HOLY LIVING then we will have good fruit. In this lesson we are going to examine our own fruit and have a chance to reflect on how we might be able to improve our own growing conditions by evaluating how we apply daily the Rules for Holy Living.

PRAYER

- Ask God to help you look honestly at the fruit your life is producing.
- Pray for understanding of any way you are not living out the Rules for Holy Living.
- Thank God that as you increase in holiness your life will produce good fruit through his power and for his glory.

SEARCHING THE SCRIPTURES

THE FRUIT OF THE SPIRIT

Galatians 5:22-25

But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self control. Against such things there is no law. Those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the sinful nature with its passions and desires. Since we live by the Spirit, let us keep in step with the Spirit.

1. What do you think the phrase, "fruit of the Spirit," means?

2. What are both the fruit of the spirit and the acts of the sinful nature a product of?

EXAMPLE: We produce what we are. If we are living holy lives, we will produce good fruit, fruit after its own kind. Lemon trees don't produce apples; sin will not produce love. Peaches are a natural consequence of growing a peach tree; the fruit of the Spirit is a natural consequence of holy living. Acts of the sinful nature are a result of living in the flesh.

RECOGNIZING THE FRUIT

Matthew 7:15-20

Watch out for false prophets. They come to you in sheep's clothing, but inwardly they are ferocious wolves. By their fruit you will recognize them. Do people pick grapes from thorn bushes, or figs from thistles? Likewise every good tree bears good fruit, but a bad tree bears bad fruit. A good tree cannot bear bad fruit, and a bad tree cannot bear good fruit. Every tree that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire. Thus, by their fruit you will recognize them.

CONCLUDING THOUGHTS

REVIEW THE RULES FOR HOLY LIVING

If you lack in any one of the fruit qualities the solution is not to make yourself produce that fruit but to go back to the RULES FOR HOLY LIVING to see where you need to make changes to improve the fruit.

1. SET YOUR HEART AND MIND ON THINGS ABOVE – What our life is focused on

ACTION: Take your eyes off of earthly things, material possessions, circumstances, relationships, etc. Look at God's goals and purposes, his will, not at yourself and your own will.

QUESTION: Is your main focus on what you can acquire or do, your own relationships and circumstances or are you becoming more interested in what God wants for you which is the development of your character?

FRUIT AFFECTED:

2. PUT TO DEATH THE EARTHLY NATURE – Where we seek gratification

ACTION: Uncover your sins, confess them and repent. Do not think about gratifying the flesh.

QUESTION: Are there any areas of sin you are holding on to that belongs to the earthly nature and you need to get rid of? (Go back to S.O.S. I and rate your sins again.) Do you focus on pleasing yourself apart from God or pleasing God?

FRUIT AFFECTED:

3. PUT ON THE NEW SELF - What our character is like

ACTION: Increase in holiness by connecting to God's divine power. Act in love.

QUESTION: Are you usually dressed with the qualities of holiness? (compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, patience, forbearance, forgiveness, love) In difficult circumstances or when you are personally attacked do you respond in the flesh or in the Spirit?

FRUIT AFFECTED:

4. LET THE PEACE OF CHRIST RULE IN YOUR HEART – How we respond to the conviction of the Holy Spirit

ACTION: Seek to discover where you are not obedient. Look to see if there is anything you have done that has caused you to lose the peace of Christ.

QUESTION: When you are not experiencing God's peace do you pursue obedience as a means of getting it back or do you blame others? Are you grateful for your situation and God's provision?

FRUIT AFFECTED:

5. LET THE WORD OF CHRIST DWELL IN YOU RICHLY - What informs our mind

ACTION: Pursue and study God's word on a daily basis.

QUESTION: Are you learning, developing, and practicing God's principles? Does your affect on others come from the effect of God's word on you? Does your praise to God come from God's truth living in you?

FRUIT AFFECTED:

6. DO EVERYTHING IN THE NAME OF JESUS - The way we live life

ACTION: Operate as an agent of Jesus by his will and in his strength. The words that come out of your mouth and the deeds that you do are under the authority of Jesus.

1. LOVE - Desire to benefit another through sacrificial giving of oneself

a) What can I learn from the example of the Good Samaritan? (Luke 10:30-37)

³⁰In reply Jesus said: "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, when he fell into the hands of robbers. They stripped him of his clothes, beat him and went away, leaving him half dead. ³¹A priest happened to be going down the same road, and when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. ³²So too, a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. ³³But a Samaritan, as he traveled, came where the man was; and when he saw him, he took pity on him. ³⁴He went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then he put the man on his own donkey, took him to an inn and took care of him. ³⁵The next day he took out two silver coins and gave them to the innkeeper. `Look after him,' he said, `and when I return, I will reimburse you for any extra expense you may have.'

³⁶"Which of these three do you think was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of robbers?" ³⁷The expert in the law replied, "The one who had mercy on him."

Jesus told him, "Go and do likewise."

b) What can I learn from the example of Jesus? (John 15:9-13)

⁹"As the Father has loved me, so have I loved you. Now remain in my love. ¹⁰If you obey my commands, you will remain in my love, just as I have obeyed my Father's commands and remain in his love. ¹¹I have told you this so that my joy may be in you and that your joy may be complete. ¹²My command is this: Love each other as I have loved you. ¹³Greater love has no one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends.

2. JOY - A deep, abiding inner rejoicing

a) What can I learn from the example of Paul and Silas? (Acts 16:22-25)

²²The crowd joined in the attack against Paul and Silas, and the magistrates ordered them to be stripped and beaten. ²³After they had been severely flogged, they were thrown into prison, and the jailer was commanded to guard them carefully. ²⁴Upon receiving such orders, he put them in the inner cell and fastened their feet in the stocks.

²⁵About midnight Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God, and the other prisoners were listening to them.

b) What can I learn from the example of Jesus? (Luke 15:4-7)

⁴"Suppose one of you has a hundred sheep and loses one of them. Does he not leave the ninety-nine in the open country and go after the lost sheep until he finds it? ⁵And when he finds it, he joyfully puts it on his shoulders ⁶and goes home. Then he calls his friends and neighbors together and says, `Rejoice with me; I have found my lost sheep.'⁷I tell you that in the same way there will be more rejoicing in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who do not need to repent."

3. PEACE - An inner rest and well being, even in external adversity

a) What can I learn from the example of Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego? (Daniel 3:16-18)

¹⁶Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego replied to the king, "O Nebuchadnezzar, we do not need to defend ourselves before you in this matter. ¹⁷If we are thrown into the blazing furnace, the God we serve is able to save us from it, and he will rescue us from your hand, O king. ¹⁸But even if he does not, we want you to know, O king, that we will not serve your gods or worship the image of gold you have set up."

b) What can I learn from the example/teaching of Jesus? (John 14:25-27)

²⁵"All this I have spoken while still with you. ²⁶But the Counselor, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you all things and will remind you of everything I have said to you. ²⁷Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid.

4. PATIENCE - Long suffering, holding back retaliation against someone who has wronged you

a) What can I learn from the example of Paul? (2 Timothy 3:10-13)

¹⁰You, however, know all about my teaching, my way of life, my purpose, faith, patience, love, endurance, ¹¹persecutions, sufferings--what kinds of things happened to me in Antioch, Iconium and Lystra, the persecutions I endured. Yet the Lord rescued me from all of them. ¹²In fact, everyone who wants to live a godly life in Christ Jesus will be persecuted, ¹³while evil men and impostors will go from bad to worse, deceiving and being deceived.

 b) What can I learn from the example of Jesus? (1 Peter 2:23)
 ²³When they hurled their insults at him, he did not retaliate; when he suffered, he made no threats. Instead, he entrusted himself to him who judges justly.

5. KINDNESS - Mild, gracious, friendly, opposite of harsh

a) What can I learn from the example of the friends of the paralytic? (Luke 5:17-20)

¹⁷One day as he was teaching, Pharisees and teachers of the law, who had come from every village of Galilee and from Judea and Jerusalem, were sitting there. And the power of the Lord was present for him to heal the sick. ¹⁸Some men came carrying a paralytic on a mat and tried to take him into the house to lay him before Jesus. ¹⁹When they could not find a way to do this because of the crowd, they went up on the roof and lowered him on his mat through the tiles into the middle of the crowd, right in front of Jesus. ²⁰When Jesus saw their faith, he said, "Friend, your sins are forgiven."

b) What can I learn from the example of Jesus? (Matt. 11:28-29) ²⁸"Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. ²⁹Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls.

6. GOODNESS - Functioning well in a moral sense; good character expressed in useful action

a) What can I learn from the example of Dorcas? (Acts 9:36-39)

³⁶In Joppa there was a disciple named Tabitha (which, when translated, is DorcasB), who was always doing good and helping the poor. ³⁷About that time she became sick and died, and her body was washed and placed in an upstairs room. ³⁸Lydda was near Joppa; so when the disciples heard that Peter was in Lydda, they sent two men to him and urged him, "Please come at once!"

³⁹Peter went with them, and when he arrived he was taken upstairs to the room. All the widows stood around him, crying and showing him the robes and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was still with them.

b) What can I learn from the example of Jesus? (John 10:11-13)

¹¹"I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. ¹²The hired hand is not the shepherd who owns the sheep. So when he sees the wolf coming, he abandons the sheep and runs away. Then the wolf attacks the flock and scatters it. ¹³The man runs away because he is a hired hand and cares nothing for the sheep.

7. FAITHFULNESS - Trustworthy, reliable

a) What can I learn from the example of Abraham? (Hebrews 11:8-11)

⁸By faith Abraham, when called to go to a place he would later receive as his inheritance, obeyed and went, even though he did not know where he was going. ⁹By faith he made his home in the promised land like a stranger in a foreign country; he lived in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. ¹⁰For he was looking forward to the city with foundations, whose architect and builder is God. ¹¹By faith Abraham, even though he was past age--and Sarah herself was barren--was enabled to become a father because he considered him faithful who had made the promise.

b) What can I learn from the example of Jesus? (2 Tim. 2:13) ¹³ if we are faithless, he will remain faithful, for he cannot disown himself.

8. GENTLENESS - Soothing disposition, meekness from strength

a) What can I learn from the example of Joseph? (Matthew 1:18-19)

¹⁸This is how the birth of Jesus Christ came about: His mother Mary was pledged to be married to Joseph, but before they came together, she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. ¹⁹Because Joseph her husband was a righteous man and did not want to expose her to public disgrace, he had in mind to divorce her quietly.

b) What can I learn from the example of Jesus? (Mark 10:13-16)

¹³People were bringing little children to Jesus to have him touch them, but the disciples rebuked them. ¹⁴When Jesus saw this, he was indignant. He said to them, "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these. ¹⁵I tell you the truth, anyone who will not receive the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it." ¹⁶And he took the children in his arms, put his hands on them and blessed them.

9. SELF-CONTROL - Self-mastery, curbing sensual impulses

a) What can I learn from the example of Joseph, son of Jacob?(Genesis 39:6-10)

⁶So he left in Joseph's care everything he had; with Joseph in charge, he did not concern himself with anything except the food he ate.

Now Joseph was well-built and handsome, ⁷ and after a while his master's wife took notice of Joseph and said, "Come to bed with me!"

⁸But he refused. "With me in charge," he told her, "my master does not concern himself with anything in the house; everything he owns he has entrusted to my care. ⁹No one is greater in this house than I am. My master has withheld nothing from me except you, because you are his wife. How then could I do such a wicked thing and sin against God?" ¹⁰And though she spoke to Joseph day after day, he refused to go to bed with her or even be with her.

b) What can I learn from the example of Jesus? (Matt. 4:1-11)

¹Then Jesus was led by the Spirit into the desert to be tempted by the devil. ²After fasting forty days and forty nights, he was hungry. ³The tempter came to him and said, "If you are the Son of God, tell these stones to become bread."

⁴Jesus answered, "It is written: `Man does not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God."

⁵Then the devil took him to the holy city and had him stand on the highest point of the temple. ⁶"If you are the Son of God," he said, "throw yourself down. For it is written:

" `He will command his angels concerning you, and they will lift you up in their hands, so that you will not strike your foot against a stone."

⁷Jesus answered him, "It is also written: `Do not put the Lord your God to the test.""

⁸Again, the devil took him to a very high mountain and showed him all the kingdoms of the world and their splendor. ⁹"All this I will give you," he said, "if you will bow down and worship me."

¹⁰Jesus said to him, "Away from me, Satan! For it is written: `Worship the Lord your God, and serve him only."" ¹¹Then the devil left him, and angels came and attended him.

10. COMPASSION - Tender sympathy toward suffering

a) What can I learn from the example of Pharaoh's daughter? (Exodus 2:5-10)

⁵Then Pharaoh's daughter went down to the Nile to bathe, and her attendants were walking along the river bank. She saw the basket among the reeds and sent her slave girl to get it. 6She opened it and saw the baby. He was crying, and she felt sorry for him. "This is one of the Hebrew babies," she said.

⁷Then his sister asked Pharaoh's daughter, "Shall I go and get one of the Hebrew women to nurse the baby for you?"

⁸"Yes, go," she answered. And the girl went and got the baby's mother. ⁹Pharaoh's daughter said to her, "Take this baby and nurse him for me, and I will pay you." So the woman took the baby and nursed him. ¹⁰When the child grew older, she took him to Pharaoh's daughter and he became her son. She named him Moses, saying, "I drew him out of the water."

b) What can I learn from the example of Jesus? (John 11:33-44)

³³When Jesus saw her weeping, and the Jews who had come along with her also weeping, he was deeply moved in spirit and troubled. 34"Where have you laid him?" he asked.

"Come and see, Lord," they replied.

³⁵Jesus wept.

³⁶Then the Jews said, "See how he loved him!"

³⁷But some of them said, "Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man have kept this man from dying?"

³⁸Jesus, once more deeply moved, came to the tomb. It was a cave with a stone laid across the entrance. ³⁹"Take away the stone," he said.

"But, Lord," said Martha, the sister of the dead man, "by this time there is a bad odor, for he has been there four days."

⁴⁰Then Jesus said, "Did I not tell you that if you believed, you would see the glory of God?"

⁴¹So they took away the stone. Then Jesus looked up and said, "Father, I thank you that you have heard me. ⁴²I knew that you always hear me, but I said this for the benefit of the people standing here, that they may believe that you sent me."

⁴³When he had said this, Jesus called in a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" ⁴⁴The dead man came out, his hands and feet wrapped with strips of linen, and a cloth around his face.

Jesus said to them, "Take off the grave clothes and let him go."

11. HUMILITY - Free of pride and dependent upon God

a) What can I learn from the example of Isaiah? (Isaiah 6:1-5)

¹In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord seated on a throne, high and exalted, and the train of his robe filled the temple. ²Above him were seraphs, each with six wings: With two wings they covered their faces, with two they covered their feet, and with two they were flying. ³And they were calling to one another: "Holy, holy, holy is the LORD Almighty; the whole earth is full of his glory."⁴At the sound of their voices the

doorposts and thresholds shook and the temple was filled with smoke.

⁵"Woe to me!" I cried. "I am ruined! For I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips, and my eyes have seen the King, the LORD Almighty."

b) What can I learn from the example of Jesus? (Phil. 2:5-8)

⁵Your attitude should be the same as that of Christ Jesus:

⁶Who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be grasped, ⁷but made himself nothing, taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. ⁸And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself and became obedient to death-- even death on a cross!

12. FORBEARANCE - To bear with, endure one another, to hold oneself back when provoked

a) What can I learn from the example of Barnabas? (Acts 15:36-40)

³⁶Some time later Paul said to Barnabas, "Let us go back and visit the brothers in all the towns where we preached the word of the Lord and see how they are doing." ³⁷Barnabas wanted to take John, also called Mark, with them, ³⁸but Paul did not think it wise to take him, because he had deserted them in Pamphylia and had not continued with them in the work. ³⁹They had such a sharp disagreement that they parted company. Barnabas took Mark and sailed for Cyprus, ⁴⁰but Paul chose Silas and left, commended by the brothers to the grace of the Lord.

b) What can I learn from the example of Jesus? (Acts 9:1-6)

¹Meanwhile, Saul was still breathing out murderous threats against the Lord's disciples. He went to the high priest ²and asked him for letters to the synagogues in Damascus, so that if he found any there who belonged to the Way, whether men or women, he might take them as prisoners to Jerusalem. ³As he neared Damascus on his journey, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. ⁴He fell to the ground and heard a voice say to him, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?"

⁵"Who are you, Lord?" Saul asked.

"I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting," he replied. ⁶"Now get up and go into the city, and you will be told what you must do."

13. FORGIVENESS - To bestow favor unconditionally, show grace by forgiving any complaints against another

a) What can I learn from the example of Stephen? (Acts 7:54-60)

⁵⁴When they heard this, they were furious and gnashed their teeth at him. ⁵⁵But Stephen, full of the Holy Spirit, looked up to heaven and saw the glory of God, and Jesus standing at the right hand of God. ⁵⁶"Look," he said, "I see heaven open and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God."

⁵⁷At this they covered their ears and, yelling at the top of their voices, they all rushed at him, ⁵⁸dragged him out of the city and began to stone him. Meanwhile, the witnesses laid their clothes at the feet of a young man named Saul.

⁵⁹While they were stoning him, Stephen prayed, "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit." ⁶⁰Then he fell on his knees and cried out, "Lord, do not hold this sin against them." When he had said this, he fell asleep.

b) What can I learn from the example of Jesus? (Luke 23:33-34)

³²Two other men, both criminals, were also led out with him to be executed. ³³When they came to the place called the Skull, there they crucified him, along with the criminals--one on his right, the other on his left. ³⁴Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." And they divided up his clothes by casting lots.



- #4 Let the peace of Christ rule in your heart.
- #5 Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly.
- #6 Do all in the name of Jesus.

- 2. There's a problem with the growing conditions, a lack of connection to the vine.

LESSON EIGHT ANSWERS

HOLINESS EXEMPLIFIED

THINKING IT THROUGH

- 1. LOVE Desire to benefit another through sacrificial giving of oneself
 - Love does what is right for everyone even at personal cost and regardless of whether there is natural affection or not. Love is an action, not an intention.
 - Showing love to others maintains our connection to Christ and his love and joy.
 - My showing love to others really demonstrates the reality of my relationship with Christ. I gain Christ's joy by loving others.
- 2. JOY A deep, abiding inner rejoicing
 - What happened to Paul and Silas didn't break their connection to God. In the midst of suffering they sought him in prayer and worship.
 - Christ's greatest joy was in seeing the Father's will come to pass, sinners who come to repentance.
 - Whatever the circumstances in my life I can experience joy if I am connected to Christ. That which will give me the greatest joy is doing the Father's will.
- 3. **PEACE** An inner rest and well being, even in external adversity
 - Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego were secure in who they were in God and who God was and the circumstances they were in didn't change their perspective.
 - Jesus has given us his Spirit so that we don't need to be troubled or afraid. His Spirit will remind us of what we need to know and do.
 - I need to recognize that God never changes and I shouldn't let my circumstances change my view of him. His Spirit will give me what I need when I need it.
- 4. PATIENCE Long suffering, holding back retaliation against someone who has wronged you
 - We need to recognize that we will suffer and be persecuted and if we depend on the Lord he will see us through our suffering.
 - Jesus didn't respond when he was attacked, he just put himself in God's hands.
 - First I need to expect suffering and not let it change the way I respond. I need to commit myself to the Lord and trust he will do the necessary work in me so I will respond correctly.
- 5. KINDNESS Mild, gracious, friendly, opposite of harsh
 - The friends cared so much about the condition of their friend that they persisted until they got him to Jesus.
 - In Jesus' kindness we find rest for our souls.
 - If I should persist and show kindness to others so that they might be led to Jesus and find rest for their souls.
- 6. GOODNESS Functioning well in a moral sense; good character expressed in useful action
 - The goodness of Dorcas caused other to truly mourn her passing. She had kept people clothed.
 - Jesus is the good shepherd who lays down his life for the sheep.
 - Goodness is demonstrated in action. If I am right with Christ I will do what is good and right for others.
- 7. FAITHFULNESS Trustworthy, reliable
 - Abraham was faithful to do what God had called him to do because he focused on God's faithfulness.
 - Jesus can only be faithful.
 - It is Christ's faithfulness that enables me to be faithful. I need to focus on him and his character, not my circumstances.
- 8. GENTLENESS Soothing disposition, meekness from strength
 - Joseph, instead of bringing everyone's attention to what he perceived Mary had done, was going to deal with it in a way that wouldn't harm Mary.
 - To others the children were inconsequential, but Jesus reached out to them to draw them to himself.
 - Those who have done wrong or "may not be worthy of my time," deserve the same kindness or attention that would be extended to anyone else.

LESSON EIGHT ANSWERS

HOLINESS EXEMPLIFIED

9. SELF CONTROL - Self mastery, curbing sensual impulses

- Joseph didn't want to sin against God and therefore would not even get near that which might cause him to fall. He lived under his accountability to God. He was a slave to righteousness.
- He countered each temptation with the word of God.
- I am accountable to God and under his authority I need to live in his presence. I need to be filled with his truth and apply it to my life and be a slave to righteousness. If God's word is controlling me then I will be under his control. I won't be easily swayed.

10. COMPASSION - Tender sympathy toward suffering

- Pharaoh's daughter felt sorry for the baby. She recognized that he had a need and did what she could to solve the problem that was laid at her feet.
- Jesus entered into the grief of others, even though he knew what he was going to do. He experienced their pain.
- Compassion should move me to action. I need for my own sake to embrace suffering so that I know what others need.

11. HUMILITY – Free of pride and dependent upon God

- Isaiah recognized the holiness of God and saw himself for who he was. He didn't let the revelation puff him up, but rather fell on his face.
- Christ made himself a servant even though he was God.
- I need to recognize who God is and who I am in relationship to him. I must be willing to lower myself to serve others.

12. FORBEARANCE - To bear with, endure one another

- Barnabas gave Mark another chance. He didn't give up on him.
- Jesus didn't reject Saul who had been his enemy. He showed forbearance and called him to do his work.
- I should never completely shut the door on someone. I cannot take offense. I need to have mercy. I have to put up with others as Christ puts up with me.
- 13. FORGIVENESS To bestow favor unconditionally, show grace by forgiving any complaints against another
 - Stephen forgave those who were killing him.
 - Jesus forgave those who were killing him.
 - If I have Christ's Spirit in me I will be able to forgive others whatever the offense. I should be able to forgive whatever minor transgressions others do to me.

CONCLUDING THOUGHTS

THINKING AND DOING WHAT'S RIGHT

- 1. Good and right things, that which is of God. Things that are excellent or praise worthy. We are not to dwell on what is evil or wrong but love the truth of God. It takes intentionality to think about what is good.
- Put it into practice.
 We have to act on what we're taught. We have to make our actions automatic through continual practice and dwelling on what is right.
- 3. The peace of God will be with us. We will experience God's presence in every circumstance.
