


What are the different kinds of plants?

A Joshua tree has spikes, which desert life does suit.






- With a multitude of branches, bushes grow like trees.

What are the different kinds of plants?

K—K Make sign of "K"

Kinds Make "K" with both hands, R hand circles over L and comes down on top

God created R fist over L, twist opposite directions and then back

plants to be R hand inside L fist, R hand pushes up out of fist & fingers spread out

K—K—Kinds Same as above

Like grass Open hand in front of chin, palm facing in, move forward & back

and bush Hands cupped together fingers spread apart, move hands apart

and tree R arm up bent at elbow, fingers spread apart, L hand on R elbow,

turn R hand back & forth
