#32 - God's Promise to Noah Genesis 8:20-9:17

PICTURES NEEDED

- 32-1 God's promise to Noah
- 32-2 What makes a rainbow

Discussion pictures visual 1-3 and 4-6

REVIEW (Before Teaching Lesson)

- <u>Journal Review:</u> Ask students to share an important truth that they learned from their journal readings at home that week. Share some of your own insights.
- <u>Previous Lesson Review:</u> (Use the visual from the last lesson to aid in review)
 Where did the ark come to rest? How did Noah know that the water had receded?
 What did Noah do after the dove came back with the olive branch?
 What did God tell Noah to do once the land was dry?
- <u>The Big Question Review:</u> What can we trust in times of trouble? Let the students give their answers to the question.
- <u>Bible Verse Review:</u> Psalm 18:2 We can always trust that God is our rock and keeps us safe.

The LORD is my rock, my fortress and my deliverer; my God is my rock, in whom I take refuge. He is my shield and the horn of my salvation, my stronghold.

LESSON CONTENT

Note: The Bible verses included in the lesson are from the NIV 1984 edition. The wording of the questions is derived from that version. If another version of the Bible is used, questions may need to be adapted.

The last lesson examined what happened during the flood and afterwards when the waters receded. How did the waters probably recede? Many of the mountains must have been pushed up at that time, making a way for the waters to flow back into the ocean basins. God also sent a wind that would have enabled the land to dry.

What did God tell Noah to do once the land was dry? Once the land was dry God told Noah to come out of the ark along with his family and all the animals. God wanted them to spread out and repopulate the earth.

What do you think was the first thing Noah did when he left the ark? Remember that Noah walked with God and was faithful. Noah wanted to show his gratitude to God for keeping him and his family safe so the first thing he did was to build an altar to the Lord and offer a pleasing sacrifice on it. (picture 32-1)

Genesis 8:20-22

²⁰Then Noah built an altar to the LORD and, taking some of all the clean animals and clean birds, he sacrificed burnt offerings on it. ²¹The LORD smelled the pleasing aroma and said in his heart: "Never again will I curse the ground because of man, even though every inclination of his heart is evil from childhood. And never again will I destroy all living creatures, as I have done.

²²"As long as the earth endures, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night will never cease."

What was God's response to Noah's sacrifice? God was pleased with Noah's sacrifice and made a promise to him that life on earth would continue, according to his design, for as long as the world endured.

What would have been different about the world Noah and his family encountered after the flood? The world would have changed a lot because of the flood. The flood would have left the earth a barren and lonely place since everything on the face of it had been wiped out by the waters. Until the plants and animals reestablished themselves, there would not have been much to eat.

There was no longer a canopy of water vapor protecting the earth from the rays of the sun. The climate would have changed and the earth would no longer have had a perfect and even temperature. There is vast geological evidence that following the flood there was an ice age that lasted several hundred years. In the midst of that altered world, God gave a new command to Noah and his sons that changed it even more.

Genesis 9:1-6

¹Then God blessed Noah and his sons, saying to them, "Be fruitful and increase in number and fill the earth. ²The fear and dread of you will fall upon all the beasts of the earth and all the birds of the air, upon every creature that moves along the ground, and upon all the fish of the sea; they are given into your hands. ³Everything that lives and moves will be food for you. Just as I gave you the green plants, I now give you everything.

⁴"But you must not eat meat that has its lifeblood still in it. ⁵And for your lifeblood I will surely demand an accounting. I will demand an accounting from every animal. And from each man, too, I will demand an accounting for the life of his fellow man.

⁶"Whoever sheds the blood of man, by man shall his blood be shed; for in the image of God has God made man. ⁷As for you, be fruitful and increase in number; multiply on the earth and increase upon it."

What does it mean that the fear and dread of man fell upon the animals? The harmonious relationship that people and animals had before the flood was broken. God had originally designed all his creation to live in a peaceful existence with one another. After the flood that all changed, and the fear and dread of people came upon the animals. Animals that hadn't been afraid were now afraid of people.

<u>Do you remember what God had told Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden that they could eat?</u> Originally, God told Adam and Eve that they could eat all the seed bearing plants and the fruit from trees. Before the flood, people didn't eat meat. They were vegetarians.

Why do you think God said people could eat meat after the flood? The damage from the flood and the changes in the earth's environment meant that there wasn't an abundance of plants to eat. It may have been that in order to survive both humans and animals had to eat meat. This was a radical change and shows how sin changed God's original plan for his creation. In spite of all this, God's love for his creation never changed and he made a promise to Noah and his sons.

Genesis 9:6-17

⁸Then God said to Noah and to his sons with him: ⁹"I now establish my covenant with you and with your descendants after you ¹⁰ and with every living creature that was with you--the birds, the livestock and all the wild animals, all those that came out of the ark with you--every living creature on earth. ¹¹I establish my covenant with you: Never again will all life be cut off by the waters of a flood; never again will there be a flood to destroy the earth."

¹²And God said, "This is the sign of the covenant I am making between me and you and every living creature with you, a covenant for all generations to come: ¹³I have set my rainbow in the clouds, and it will be the sign of the covenant between me and the earth. ¹⁴Whenever I bring clouds over the earth and the rainbow appears in the clouds, ¹⁵I will remember my covenant between me and you and all living creatures of every kind. Never again will the waters become a flood to destroy all life. ¹⁶Whenever the rainbow appears in the clouds, I will see it and remember the everlasting covenant between God and all living creatures of every kind on the earth."

¹⁷So God said to Noah, "This is the sign of the covenant I have established between me and all life on the earth."

What is a covenant? A covenant is a promise.

What was God's covenant with Noah? Because God was pleased with Noah, he made a promise that he would never again destroy the earth by a flood.

What is the sign of God's covenant with Noah? A rainbow is the sign of God's covenant with Noah. The atmosphere of the earth must have been filled with water vapor because of the flood causing a rainbow to appear. God said that the rainbow would be a sign of his covenant. Because of God's promise, people didn't have to worry when storm clouds appeared in the sky that God would be sending another flood to destroy the earth.

That promise, however, doesn't mean that the earth will last forever. God has said that one day this world will be destroyed and he will create a new heaven and earth. That heaven and earth will be a perfect place where those who love Jesus will dwell with him. Revelations 2:1-4 describes what it will be like.

¹Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth, for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away, and there was no longer any sea. ²I saw the Holy City, the new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride beautifully dressed for her husband. ³And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Now the dwelling of God is with men, and he will live with them. They will be his people, and God himself will be with them and be their God. ⁴He will wipe every tear from their eyes. There will be no more death or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order of things has passed away."

What will be the difference between the new heaven and earth and the old? In the new heaven and earth, Christ will be present there and live with men. There will be no pain and suffering. It will be the opposite of the world we live in. It will be a perfect place where Christ reigns as king.

LESSON WRAP-UP

- Overview Questions: What did Noah do when he left the ark? How did God respond to his sacrifice? What was changed about the earth after the flood? What covenant did God establish with Noah? What was the sign of the covenant? What will eventually happen to the earth?
- <u>Thought Questions:</u> What do you think Noah was thinking as he came off the ark? Why do you think God made a covenant with Noah? Why do you think God will destroy the earth eventually?
- <u>Prayer:</u> Thank God that his love for all men and his creation never ends and that he has a plan for a new heaven and earth where all things will be made right again. Thank God that he has made a way for you through Jesus to dwell in the new heaven and earth.
- <u>The Big Question:</u> What was God's promise to Noah after the flood? Let the students give their answers to the question. Share the memory verse. Ask how it answers the question.
- Memory Verse: Genesis 8:21-22 The earth will never again be destroyed by a flood.

"Never again will I curse the ground because of man, even though every inclination of his heart is evil from childhood. And never again will I destroy all living creatures, as I have done. ²²"As long as the earth endures, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night will never cease."

ACTIVITIES (Completed after the lesson)

Any age appropriate activity can be included which fits into the class time. The activities with a star are included on the class notes.

- ★ Lesson Notes: Have the children answer the two questions individually or as a group. What did you learn from this lesson? How can you put into practice what you learned?
- ★ Memory Verse: Read the memory verse on the cover of the class notes and then have the students fill in the blanks in the verse.
- Activity Page: What makes a rainbow? (picture 32-2)
 Sunlight is made up of light waves of different lengths and colors, which we just see blended together as white light. When sunlight passes through raindrops (water vapor) in the air, the light rays bend and separate according to wavelengths. That makes the colors of the light waves visible to us. (This can be demonstrated by shining a flashlight through a prism or using a CD to reflect light.)

 The top of the rainbow is formed by the rays with the longest wavelength since they bend the least and the shortest waves bend the most. Unscramble the words to see the seven colors of the rainbow in order from the longest wavelength to the shortest: red, orange, yellow, green, blue, indigo, violet. Note: Indigo is no longer considered a separate color.
- ★ <u>This Week's Big Question</u>: Have the students fill in the blanks for the way the memory verse answers the big question.

The earth will never again be destroyed by a flood.

- ★ Coloring Page: Color the lesson picture.
- Craft: Rainbow Streamers
 As a reminder that God sent a rainbow as a sign that he would never again destroy the earth by a flood, make a rainbow streamer.
 Materials: yellow cover stock paper, white paper or colored (red, blue, yellow, green, orange) strips of paper (tissue, crepe, construction, etc.), string, scissors, glue stick. Preparation: Run off the craft 32 sunburst on yellow cover stock paper. Run off the colored strips on white paper or cut strips of tissue, crepe or construction paper of the different colors that make up a rainbow.
 - Instructions: Cut out the sunburst and the strips of paper. Glue the strips of paper to the sunburst. Punch a hole at the top and attach a loop of string to hang it from.
- Game: Find the colors of the rainbow
 As a reminder that God sent a rainbow as a sign that he would never again destroy the earth by a flood, play find the colors of the rainbow.
 Instructions: Hide pieces of paper that are the colors in a rainbow. Divide into teams.
 The first team to collect all the colors of the rainbow wins.

JOURNAL

The journal is passed out at the end of class for the students to complete at home. It has six poetic readings and related Bible verses. It would be beneficial for the teacher to read through and be familiar with its content.
