1 Corinthians 15:13-14

13If there is no resurrection of the dead, then not even Christ has been raised. 14And (if Christ has not been raised, our preaching is useless and so is your faith).

Level 3—Parent Notes:

- <u>Daily Reading</u>: Depending on the age and ability of the child, or parent preference, the child may do the work in this journal independently or read with and dictate an answer to the parent. After reading the day's rhyme and the Bible verse, the child should draw a picture that relates to that day's reading and answer the question at the bottom of the page. Have the child answer questions about the day's reading from the Daily Reading Questions at the back of the booklet. Personal ideas and additional questions from the parent can also be included.
- <u>Lesson Verse</u>: The lesson verse which answers the week's big question should be practiced daily. One way to do this is to black out words in the verse each day and say the verse inserting the correct word. By the end of the week the whole verse would be blacked out and recited by memory. Depending on the age and/or ability of the child, either the whole verse or the part of the verse between brackets on the cover can be memorized.
- <u>Concluding Lesson</u>: The parent should discuss with the child the Thinking it Through questions: What important truth did you learn this week? How can you apply that truth in your life? After discussing the questions the child should write down (or dictate to the parent) the answers and a prayer at the end of the booklet. The child can then complete the other activities.
- <u>Completion</u>: If the student brings this booklet back to the teacher on Sunday, with each day's work completed and the lesson verse memorized, the student will receive acknowledgement of a job well done.
- <u>Way to go. parents!</u> Your faithfulness in teaching your children the deed and statutes of the Lord isn't always easy, but it honors God and will have an eternal impact. Keep up the good work! Remember Galatians 6:9, *Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up.*

Daily Reading Questions

<u>Day 3</u>: What was rolled across the opening of the tomb? What were Jesus' followers thinking?

<u>Day 4</u>: What did the women find when they went back to the tomb? Why was that a good thing?

<u>Day 5</u>: What did Jesus prove by rising from the dead? How did the disciples feel about that? What do we receive by believing in Jesus? What does that mean?

<u>Day 6</u>: What does it mean to be blessed? When are we blessed? What does that mean? Why should we trust Jesus? What happens when we trust in Jesus?

Concluding Lesson

<u>Review</u>: What does it mean to be crucified? Why was Jesus crucified? What is the resurrection? How do we know Jesus rose from the dead? What does the resurrection show about Jesus? What does the resurrection mean for us?

<u>Prayer</u>: Thank Jesus for dying on the cross for your sin. Thank God that Jesus overcame death by rising from the grave. Thank him that through Jesus he forgives your sin. Pray that you would honor what he has done by wanting to please him in the things you do.

<u>Application</u>: Pray for opportunities to share about what Jesus has done for us with your friends.

<u>Thinking It Through</u>: Have the child write or dictate what important truth was learned from the lesson, how he/she can apply that truth, and a prayer to God.

Easter 1 How important is the resurrection of Jesus to our faith?



Our faith depends on the resurrection of Jesus.

Day 1 Draw a picture of Jesus on the cross.

When they crucified our Lord it was a sad and dreadful day,
But the punishment for all our sins someone had to pay.
Into his hands and feet with a hammer nails were driven.
It is through Christ's pain and suffering that we have been forgiven.



Draw a picture of Jesus.

We are blessed when we believe what we have not seen, Thanking God through Jesus from our sin we are made clean. We are to trust in Jesus as God's one and only Son. Knowing through his resurrection, death was overcome.

What does the verse mean?

Luke 23:33⁻³³ When they came to the place called the Skull, they crucified him there, along with the criminals—one on his right, the other on his left.

What does the verse mean?

John 20:29⁻²⁹ Then Jesus told him, "Because you have seen me, you have believed; blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed."

Day 5 Draw a picture of the risen Christ.

Jesus rose up from the dead; they were no longer sad. He proved that he is God which made them really glad. Through his resurrection, death he overcame. Now forgiveness and salvation are found in Jesus' name.

Day 2 Draw a picture of Jesus being taken down.

When Jesus died they took him down and laid him in a grave.
Mockers still were saying, "His own life he couldn't save."
The disciples were confused as they knew what he had said.
In three days, he had claimed, he would rise up from the dead.

What does the verse mean?

1 John $4:13-14-^{13}$ This is how we know that we live in him and he in us: He has given us of his Spirit. ¹⁴ And we have seen and testify that the Father has sent his Son to be the Savior of the world. What does the verse mean?

Luke 23:34-35⁻³⁴ Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." And they divided up his clothes by casting lots. ³⁵ The people stood watching, and the rulers even sneered at him. They said, "He saved others; let him save himself if he is God's Messiah, the Chosen One."

Day 3 Draw a picture of the tomb and rock.

A rock was rolled across the opening of the tomb. His followers were sad and their hearts were filled with gloom. But as they went back to their homes and on their beds did lay. They put their trust in God to work things out his way.

Day 4

Draw a picture of the women at the tomb.

Some women went back to the tomb his body to prepare. Imagine their surprise when they couldn't find it there. The stone that covered up the tomb had been rolled away. The body of our Savior in the grave no longer lay.

What does the verse mean?

John $19:41-42^{-41}$ At the place where Jesus was crucified, there was a garden, and in the garden a new tomb, in which no one had ever been laid. ⁴² Because it was the Jewish day of Preparation and since the tomb was nearby, they laid Jesus there.

What does the verse mean?

John 20:1-2-Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene went to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the entrance. ² So she came running to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one Jesus loved, and said, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we don't know where they have put him!"
