WHO IS THE **HOLY SPIRIT?**



INTRODUCTION



LESSON FOCUS

This lesson will develop understanding of the triune nature of God and the person of the Holy Spirit.

1. **Deuteronomy 6:4** – ⁴ Hear, O Israel: The LORD our God, the LORD is one.

How many Gods are there? There is only one God.

2. Matthew 3:16-17

¹⁶ As soon as Jesus was baptized, he went up out of the water. At that moment heaven was opened, and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and lighting on him. ¹⁷ And a voice from heaven said, "This is my Son, whom I love, with him I am well pleased.

What can be learned about the person of God from the description of the baptism of Jesus? All three persons of God are seen in the passage: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. The one and only God exists in three persons.

3. John 14:10

¹⁰ Don't you believe that I am in the Father, and that the Father is in me? The words I say to you are not just my own. Rather, it is the Father, living in me, who is doing his work.

What is the relationship of the Son to the Father? The Father is in the Son and the Son is in the Father. They are one in the same God, but distinct persons.

4. The Holy Spirit is the third person of the trinity. What is the doctrine of the trinity? God is one in nature and essence but exists in three persons, three dimensions of the one God.



Illustration: A book is one essence, but has three dimensions: height, width and depth. They are separate entities of the one book. Take away one of the dimensions and the book will no longer exist. Hold up a book to demonstrate.





AN EXPLANATION OF THE TRINITY

<u>The Father</u> is the essence of God. The Father is whom we think of when we refer generally to God. In the Bible, God is said to dwell on high and oversee his creation.

<u>The Son (Jesus)</u> is God in the flesh. Jesus came to earth as a man in physical form to reveal the glory, truth and nature of God. He made a way for us to come back into a right relationship with God by dying on the cross. Jesus is the means by which we come to know the Father.


The **Holy Spirit** is God's presence here on earth. The Holy Spirit dwells with us when we put our faith in Jesus. The Holy Spirit is the one who gives us the power to live rightly with God and provides the means by which we understand our need for a savior and come to know Jesus.



Explanation: Jesus Christ is the Son of God who was sent to earth by the Father to testify to the truth of God, reveal God's glory, and die on the cross for the sins of all people. After Jesus died on the cross and rose from the dead, he left his Holy Spirit to be with us here on earth and lead us in his way.

Illustration: The triune nature of God can be better understood when compared to the nature and effect of the sun. There are three distinct aspects to the sun that are part of the essential whole and can't exist separately: the sun itself, the sunlight that comes from the sun and the effect of sunlight on the earth.





SEARCHING THE SCRIPTURES



THE HOLY SPIRIT IS A PERSON, NOT A FORCE

1. The person of the Holy Spirit.

Ephesians 1:17 - ¹⁷ I keep asking that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the glorious Father, may give you the Spirit of wisdom and revelation, so that you may know him better.

1 Corinthians 2:11 - 11 For who among men knows the thoughts of a man except the man's spirit within him? In the same way no one knows the thoughts of God except the Spirit of God.

In order to know God's thoughts, what must the Holy Spirit have?
The Spirit has a m <u>mind/intellect</u> .
Ephesians 4:30 - ³⁰ And do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God, with whom you were sealed for the day of redemption.
What does our being able to grieve the Holy Spirit mean he has?
The Spirit has e <u>Emotions/feeling/sensibilities</u> .
1 Corinthians 12:11 - ¹¹ All these are the work of one and the same Spirit, and he gives them to each one, just as he determines.
What does the way the Spirit gives out gifts mean he has?
The Spirit has a w

2. What are the implications of these three aspects of the person of the Holy Spirit for us?

Mind/Intellect: We can learn what is right and true from him. We need to be informed by him.

Emotions/Feelings/Sensibilities: We can please or displease him. We need to want what he wants. He has an opinion of our thoughts, words and actions.

Will: He has a perfect plan for us, which we need to learn and follow. He wants us to think, speak and act in a certain way.

3. What difference does it make that the Holy Spirit is a he (person) rather than an it (force)?

An it would be an impersonal, all-powerful force that is neither good nor evil. It would have no morality.

The power of a force could be harnessed for our own will. A person can be known and has a personal will. You can have a relationship with a person, but not with a force.






Illustration: Electricity is a force that can be channeled and utilized for good or bad purposes. There is nothing personal about electricity; you can't have a relationship with it.

What is the Spirit's relationship to the Father? He is the Spirit of the Father. He comes from and belongs to the Father.



What is the Spirit's relationship to Jesus?
He is the Spirit of the Jesus. He comes from and belongs to Jesus.

3. **John 15:26** – ²⁶"When the Counselor comes, whom I will send to you from the Father, the Spirit of truth who goes out from the Father, he will testify about me.

John 16:7 – ⁷But I tell you the truth: It is for your good that I am going away. Unless I go away, the Counselor will not come to you; but if I go, I will send him to you.

THE FUNCTION OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

1. How did the Holy Spirit function in creation?

Genesis 1:2 - 2 Now the earth was formless and empty, darkness was over the surface of the deep, and the Spirit of God was hovering over the waters.

He was there and a part of it. He witnessed it and can testify to it.

2. How did the Holy Spirit function in the life of Christ?

Luke 1:35 - 35 The angel answered [Mary], "The Holy Spirit will come on you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. So the holy one to be born will be called the Son of God. He was conceived by means of the Holy Spirit. He was the conduit of God's power.

Matthew 4:1 - Then Jesus was led by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. Jesus was led by the Spirit into a difficult situation, so who Jesus is would be revealed.

Luke 4:18 - 18 "The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."



Note: In the verse above, Jesus was quoting the Prophet Isaiah.

Jesus received power by the Spirit. The Spirit was the means by which his mission was fulfilled. His anointment enabled Jesus to speak and heal.

3. How does the Holy Spirit function in the lives of believers?

Acts 1:8 - 8 But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." Believers receive power from the Spirit to witness about Jesus.

Romans 8:13 - 13 For if you live according to the flesh, you will die; but if by the Spirit you put to death the misdeeds of the body, you will live.

The Holy Spirit enables believers to overcome sin.

Romans 8:14 - 14 For those who are led by the Spirit of God are the children of God. The Holy Spirit leads believers.

Romans 8:26 - 26 In the same way, the Spirit helps us in our weakness. We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us through wordless groans.

The Holy Spirit helps us in our weakness and intercedes for us.



2 Thessalonians 2:13 - ¹³ But we ought always to thank God for you, brothers and sisters loved by the Lord, because God chose you as firstfruits to be saved through the sanctifying work of the Spirit and through belief in the truth. The Holy Spirit does the work of sanctification in us. He is the means by which change is accomplished in our lives.



Note: Sanctification is the process by which a believer is changed into a new person, overcomes the power of sin and is empowered to serve Christ.

4. How did the work of the Holy Spirit in Jesus' life on earth compare to the work he does in our lives?

Like Jesus we are led and empowered by the Holy Spirit. The Spirit didn't need to do a sanctifying work in Jesus like he does in us.

THE HOLY SPIRIT IS THE POWER OF GOD TO ACCOMPLISH HIS WILL

Colossians 1:9-12

⁹For this reason, since the day we heard about you, we have not stopped praying for you and asking God to fill you with the knowledge of his will through all spiritual wisdom and understanding. ¹⁰And we pray this in order that you may live a life worthy of the Lord and may please him in every way: bearing fruit in every good work, growing in the knowledge of God, ¹¹being strengthened with all power according to his glorious might so that you may have great endurance and patience, and joyfully ¹²giving thanks to the Father, who has qualified you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the kingdom of light.

- 1. What did Paul want the Colossians to be filled with? (vs. 9)

 The knowledge of God's will through gaining spiritual wisdom and understanding.
- Why did he want that for them? (vs. 10)
 So they could live a life worthy of God and please him in every way by bearing good fruit.
- 3. How would they be able to do that? (vs. 11)

 By being strengthened by God's power, being filled with the Holy Spirit.
- 4. What is the relationship between our will, God's will and the Holy Spirit?

 The Holy Spirit reveals God's will; does God's will; changes our will to conform to God's will; and enables us to do God's will.

Our will can function contrary to God's will. God doesn't empower us to do our will; he empowers us to do his will.





Remember: Living a life that pleases God has two main components supplied by his Spirit.

- 1. Knowing God's will The Spirit imparts spiritual wisdom and understanding.
- 2. Being strengthened The Spirit empowers us to do God's will.

Romans 15:17-19

¹⁷ Therefore I glory in Christ Jesus in my service to God. ¹⁸ I will not venture to speak of anything except what Christ has accomplished through me in leading the Gentiles to obey God by what I have said and done — ¹⁹ by the power of signs and wonders, through the power of the Spirit of God. So from Jerusalem all the way around to Illyricum, I have fully proclaimed the gospel of Christ.

- 1. How did Paul proclaim the gospel and accomplish the work of Christ? By the power of the Holy Spirit.
- 2. What does that mean for us in terms of our service to God? To accomplish God's work, we too need to be filled with his Spirit. We can't accomplish what God desires apart from his Spirit working in us.

LESSON FOCUS

This lesson covers the work of the Holy Spirit in the world. It examines the Spirit's work in the lives of unbelievers. The next lesson will look at the Spirit's work in the lives of believers. How do you think the work of the Holy Spirit in the world is different from that in the life of a believer?

The Holy Spirit convicts the world of sin in order for people to see their need for Jesus (external). In the believer, the Holy Spirit also convicts of sin but his work is related to the process of sanctification and transformation (internal). The Holy Spirit also reveals truth and empowers the believer.



SEARCHING THE SCRIPTURES



THE SPIRIT'S WORK IN THE WORLD

John 15:26-16:11

²⁶"When the Counselor comes, whom I will send to you from the Father, the Spirit of truth who goes out from the Father, he will testify about me. ²⁷And you also must testify, for you have been with me from the beginning.

16"All this I have told you so that you will not go astray. ²They will put you out of the synagogue; in fact, a time is coming when anyone who kills you will think he is offering a service to God. ³They will do such things because they have not known the Father or me. ⁴I have told you this, so that when the time comes you will remember that I warned you. I did not tell you this at first because I was with you.

⁵"Now I am going to him who sent me, yet none of you asks me, 'Where are you going?' ⁶Because I have said these things, you are filled with grief. ⁷ But I tell you the truth: It is for your good that I am going away. Unless I go away, the Counselor will not come to you; but if I go, I will send him to you. ⁸ When he comes, he will convict the world of guilt in regards to sin and righteousness and judgment: ⁹ in regard to sin, because men do not believe in me; ¹⁰ in regard to righteousness, because I am going to the Father, where you can see me no longer; ¹¹ and in regard to judgment, because the prince of this world now stands condemned.

1. What are the two names that Jesus uses to describe the Holy Spirit? (vs. 26) Spirit of truth, counselor



Note: The word counselor (paraclete) in verses 15:26 and 16:7 refers to a legal counselor or advocate, one who gives legal aid and advice.

- 2. Who thinks they need legal assistance?

 People in legal trouble. Those who have broken the law; those who are accused of breaking the law; and those who feel they have been illegally wronged.
- 3. The first job of a good attorney is to let his client know what his legal standing is in terms of the charges against him. How does the first job of a good attorney relate to the work of the Holy Spirit in the world? The Holy Spirit convicts the world of guilt, shows people their sin. Lets them know they are guilty before God and deserving of punishment.



Note: The word convict (elencho) in verse 16:8 means to tell an offender his fault, how he is guilty under the law.

- 4. The second thing a good attorney does for his client is to give him the best legal remedy for his situation. How does the second thing an attorney does relate to the Holy Spirit's work in the world?
 - 15:26 The Holy Spirit is a witness to the world of who Christ is.
 - 16:8-9 Convicts the world of sin and their need for Jesus' righteousness



5. What is the legal remedy the Holy Spirit presents to the problem of sin. Faith in Christ brings righteousness, unbelief brings judgment



THE WORLD'S NEED FOR THE HOLY SPIRIT

1. Under each verse summarize the reason that the world needs the work of the Holy Spirit.

1 Corinthians 2:14 - 14The man without the Spirit does not accept the things that come from the Spirit of God, for they are foolishness to him, and he cannot understand them, because they are spiritually discerned. Condition of the natural man is unable to know the truth

Ephesians 4:18 - 18 They are darkened in their understanding and separated from the life of God because of the ignorance that is in them due to the hardening of their hearts.

Darkened understanding and hardened hearts keep people from God.

John 6:44 - 44"No one can come to me unless the Father who sent me draws him, and I will raise him up at the last day.

No man can come to the Father without being drawn by the Holy Spirit.

2. Without the work of the Holy Spirit in the world, what would happen to people? They would remain in darkness, oblivious to their need for a savior. They would never see the depth of their depravity. They would blame their own evil on others. Ultimately, it leads to death and separation from God.



COMMON AND SAVING GRACE

John 1:6-13

⁶There came a man who was sent from God; his name was John. ⁷He came as a witness to testify concerning that light, so that through him all men might believe. ⁸He himself was not the light; he came only as a witness to the light. ⁹The true light that gives light to every man was coming into the world.

¹⁰He was in the world, and though the world was made through him, the world did not recognize him. ¹¹He came to that which was his own, but his own did not receive him. ¹²Yet to all who received him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God— 13 children born not of natural descent, nor of human decision or a husband's will, but born of God.

- 1. What does the light do to all people? The light shines on all people and enables them to see God and therefore choose to believe. This is common grace.
- 2. What happens to those who receive the light? They choose to believe and are therefore saved. This is saving grace.



- 3. What is the difference between common grace and saving grace? All men see the light; some men come into the light
- 4. Common grace is the grace God shows to all people through his long-suffering and forbearance, which delays the punishment people deserve and gives time and opportunity for them to repent and receive God's saving grace.

Saving grace is the gracious gift of God given to those who put their faith in Jesus and the work he did on their behalf. Saving grace is the grace that saves sinners from the penalty and power of their sin and gives them a new nature in Jesus and entrance into God's eternal kingdom.

The Holy Spirit's work in the world is the work of God's c <u>common</u>	grace.
Holy Spirit's work in the lives of believers is God's s <u>saving</u>	_ grace.
Without the c <u>conviction</u> of the Spirit revealing man's s	sin ,
the door of God's m or saving grace remains close	ed.

THINKING IT THROUGH



THE CONVICTING WORK OF THE SPIRIT – RICHARD'S TESTIMONY

As a young man in my early 20s, I was living a self-centered, hedonistic lifestyle in Mammoth Mountain, California. Late one night after partying and drinking, a friend and I decided to go to the hot springs in the desert below. As I was preparing to jump into the warm waters I looked down and was shocked to see a body floating there.

I immediately grabbed the body and pulled it up on shore to begin CPR. As I was doing chest compressions, someone came up next to me and said, "It's too late. He's been dead a while." Immediately I fired questions like, What do you mean? Who is he? Who are you?

The man who had come up to me said that he and a group of friends were up there partying, drinking and smoking and that at some point their friend fell into the water and drowned. I was self-righteously irate and spewed out venomous words, "How could you do that to your friend? How could you just leave him there and go on partying?"



Fuming, I marched off and climbed up the trail to notify the sheriff. As I fumed a voice broke through my self-righteous thoughts, "Richard, you're just like them. You put alcohol above people all the time." As hard as I tried to shove that thought out, I couldn't. Looking back I could see that moment as the first time the Holy Spirit broke through my hard heart with conviction.

From that moment on the Holy Spirit began orchestrating the events of my life. As a result, just a few months later, after recognizing the fullness of my depravity and dependence on alcohol, I put my faith in Jesus and the work he did on my behalf. Because of his saving grace I was able to leave that life, move ahead and only look back to remember what I was saved from. The prayers of my family for my salvation were answered.

What can you learn about the work of the Holy Spirit through Richard's testimony?



THE CONVINCING WORK OF THE SPIRIT – MARTY'S TESTIMONY

During my early 20s in the Vietnam War Era, I spent two years in Paraguay in the Peace Corps. I had joined the Peace Corps to make my mark on the world and bring positive change to disadvantaged people. I was a disillusioned college graduate who had lost whatever faith I had while in college and viewed the U.S. as a disappointing and oppressive place.

My time in Paraguay changed my perceptions. I came to see that the U.S. wasn't as bad as I thought and my mind became open to the idea that there might be a God. When I came home I started going to weird churches as I felt I needed God but was resistant to the idea that I needed Jesus. It was during this time I met the man who would become my husband.

I started going with Richard to a prayer group because that is what he did every other Saturday night. At first it all seemed strange to me. A lot of time was spent praying and waiting on the Lord, but people were also prophesying and speaking in tongues. I went for weeks because I wanted to spend time with the man I had come to love and respect.

One night sitting there it dawned on me that I had come to believe in Jesus. I remember thinking, "This is true. I believe it to be true. I am a sinner and I need Jesus." There was nothing particularly noteworthy about it, just a quiet realization of faith. That summer Richard and I were married and began living a life of faith together. My father-in-law's prayers for a wife for his son were answered.

What can you learn about the work of the Holy Spirit through Marty's testimony?

THE SPIRIT'S STRIVING WITH MAN

Genesis 6:3 - 3 Then the LORD said, "My Spirit will not contend with man forever, for he is mortal; his days will be a hundred and twenty years."

LESSON FOCUS

This lesson will focus on the work of the Holy Spirit in the lives of believers. How does the work of the Holy Spirit change in a person's life after the person puts his faith in the saving work of Jesus Christ? Once they are delivered from penalty of sin, believers are given power to overcome sin. The work changes from bringing us pardon into making us right. Before coming to Christ, work is unsolicited and mostly external. After putting faith in Christ, the work is solicited and internal.



SEARCHING THE SCRIPTURES



THE HOLY SPIRIT'S WORK IN BELIEVERS

Romans 8:1-17

¹Therefore, there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus, ²because through Christ Jesus the law of the Spirit of life set me free from the law of sin and death. ³For what the law was powerless to do in that it was weakened by the sinful nature, God did by sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful man to be a sin offering. And so he condemned sin in sinful man, ⁴in order that the righteous requirements of the law might be fully met in us, who do not live according to the sinful nature but according to the Spirit.

⁵Those who live according to the sinful nature have their minds set on what that nature desires; but those who live in accordance with the Spirit have their minds set on what the Spirit desires. ⁶The mind of sinful man is death, but the mind controlled by the Spirit is life and peace; ⁷the sinful mind is hostile to God. It does not submit to God's law, nor can it do so. ⁸Those controlled by the sinful nature cannot please God.

⁹You, however, are controlled not by the sinful nature but by the Spirit, if the Spirit of God lives in you. And if anyone does not have the Spirit of Christ, he does not belong to Christ. ¹⁰But if Christ is in you, your body is dead because of sin, yet your spirit is alive because of righteousness. ¹¹And if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies through his Spirit, who lives in you.

¹²Therefore, brothers, we have an obligation—but it is not to the sinful nature, to live according to it. ¹³For if you live according to the sinful nature, you will die; but if by the Spirit you put to death the misdeeds of the body, you will live, ¹⁴because those who are led by the Spirit of God are sons of God. ¹⁵For you did not receive a spirit that makes you a slave again to fear, but you received the Spirit of sonship. And by him we cry, "Abba, Father." ¹⁶The Spirit himself testifies with our spirit that we are God's children. ¹⁷Now if we are children, then we are heirs—heirs of God and co-heirs with Christ, if indeed we share in his sufferings in order that we may also share in his glory.

- 1. Why is there no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus? (vs. 2)

 Because the requirement of the law to punish sin was met through Christ offering himself for the payment of our sins. Believing in Christ (justification) puts us under the law of the Spirit which sets us free from the law of sin and death (sanctification).
- 2. What is the law of sin and death?

 The wages of sin is death. It is the state into which we are born. We give into our sin nature, which leads to death. It is a state of hostility to God. It can't submit to him. We know what is right to do but we can't do it.
- 3. What is the law of the Spirit of life? Christ paid the penalty for our sin. It is the change that happens in us when we put our faith in Jesus. The Spirit works in us and we become a new creation, able to do what is right from a right heart. We are led by the Spirit and become sons of God.
- 4. Why was God's Son made into our likeness to be a sin offering for us? (vs. 4) In order that the righteous requirements of the law might be fully met. Through the work of Christ on the cross, we are set free from the law of sin and death.
- 5. What are the righteous requirements of the law? (vs. 4)

 The purpose of Christ's dying for us wasn't just to forgive our sin but to make us right and able to follow the law. We do what is right from a right heart.



- 6. When are the righteous requirements of the law met in us? (vs. 4)
 When we put to death the misdeeds of the body and live according to the Spirit.
- 7. What is the result of setting our desires on something?

 We are controlled by whatever we set our mind on and want. We act in accordance with our desires.
- 8. What is the difference between those who live according to their sinful nature and those who live according to the Spirit? (vs. 5-9)

Sinful nature – mind set on natural desires – controlled by natural desires = death Spirit – mind set on what Spirit desires – controlled by Spirit = life and peace



Note: If we want what the Spirit wants, we have the freedom to do what we want because what we want to do is what is right to do. If we are dead to sin, we no longer want to sin. That is the reason Jesus was without sin; he only wanted what the Father wanted.

- 9. If the Holy Spirit of God lives in us, what becomes true about us? (vs. 15-16) We are children of God, heirs of God. We have a new heritage born of a new nature.
- 10. What does it mean to be a co-heir with Christ? (vs. 17)

 We share in both his sufferings and his glory. We are children of God and part of the same family.



THE PARTS OF SALVATION


The Holy Spirit works in the life of a believer as the believer yields control of his life to the Holy Spirit's indwelling presence. The Holy Spirit transforms the mind and heart of the believer, changing desires. With new desires coming from a new heart, the believer becomes able to meet the righteous requirements of God's law because he now wants to do what God wants.

The work of the Spirit in the life of the believer is to make him holy, as God is holy. That work is called <u>sanctification</u>. The work of the Holy Spirit in the world is to bring people to accept their need for Christ's forgiveness and to place their faith in the work of Christ on the cross. That is <u>justification</u>. The work of the Holy Spirit in the lives of those who have been justified through faith in Christ (believers) is to sanctify (give a new nature that no longer desires sin but desires what is good and right).

THE PURPOSE OF THE SPIRITS WORK

Titus 3:3-7

³At one time we too were foolish, disobedient, deceived and enslaved by all kinds of passions and pleasures. We lived in malice and envy, being hated and hating one another. ⁴But when the kindness and love of God our Savior appeared, ⁵he saved us, not because of righteous things we had done, but because of his mercy. He saved us through the washing of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit, ⁶whom he poured out on us generously through Jesus Christ our Savior, ⁷so that, having been justified by his grace, we might become heirs having the hope of eternal life.

Definitions:

Rebirth – polingenesia (polin – again; genesis – birth)
Renewal – anakainosis (ana – again; kainosis – of a different kind)
Everything is of a new and different nature

- What does it mean to be saved through the washing of rebirth and the renewal of the Holy Spirit? (vs. 5)
 The old is washed away and dissolved by the birth of the new, which is of a totally different nature.
 With rebirth we start fresh. With renewal we are given a new nature and heart. Rebirth would be pointless without renewal, as we would end up in the same place. We need a new heart to abide with Christ.
- 2. What is the ultimate purpose of the work of the Holy Spirit in our lives?

 To bring sinful men into a relationship with their Holy God (justification) and change them from sinners into saints, making them heirs, having the hope of eternal life (sanctification).
- 3. What in this passage shows the character of God and the immense love he has for us? What he did for us was generous and came out of his love and kindness. He did it for us, not because we were righteous, but because he is merciful. He wants to dwell with us for all eternity and made a way for that to happen because he loves us.



THINKING IT THROUGH



THE SANCTIFYING WORK OF THE SPIRIT – MARTY'S TESTIMONY

About twelve years after putting my faith in Jesus I came to a crisis in my life. We had built a house and planted a church and I was working full-time with three young children. I was stressed and unhappy, wanting to blame everyone else for my discontent. During that time I just about destroyed my marriage and family. One time as I was ranting on criticizing other people, my husband said to me, "Marty, other people aren't your problem; your own sin is your problem." Of course that wasn't something that I wanted to hear, and I felt like throwing a chair at him.

One thing I can say about the Holy Spirit is that he is relentless. I couldn't get what my husband said out of my head. I also realized that unless I really wanted to destroy my marriage and family something about me needed to change.

It was at that point that a deep, sanctifying work of the Spirit began in my life and continues every day. Up until that time I had the attitude toward God, "Just tell me what to do and I'll do it." Just like the Pharisees of Jesus' time, I thought I could be good on my own by following God's law. Although I knew that I sinned, I saw sin as an aberration, not at the core of who I was. My breakdown caused me to see myself for who I really was, a sinner, not only in need of a savior, but also in need of the Holy Spirit to work in me and change me. I saw change wasn't something I could do on my own.

Two impactful studies came out of that crisis, which are available through Ultimate Outcomes, Sinners Overcoming Self (SOS 1) and Saints Obeying the Spirit (SOS 2). Working through those studies myself and then taking other women through them was of great benefit to me as it caused me to be continually aware of my sin and need to repent and overcome. The beneficial result has been a work of the Holy Spirit and God's truth in my life, which has brought great blessing to me and my family.

As I look back, I am grateful for the work the Holy Spirit has done in me, my marriage and family. The worst time in my life became the best time, because without it I wouldn't have learned to yield to the Holy Spirit and to open myself up to his sanctifying work. Thank God that he didn't leave me where I was. Sin is a progressive disease and if we don't deal with it, it gets worse and worse. In contrast, yielding to the Spirit brings increasing righteousness.

What was the sanctifying work the Spirit did in Marty's life? He caused her to recognize that she couldn't follow the law and do what was right on her own. She needed a work to be done in her.





THE SANCTIFYING WORK OF THE SPIRIT – THE APOSTLE PAUL

The Apostle Paul came to Christ through a dramatic conversion experience on the road to Damascus. At the time he was persecuting Christians and was on his way to Damascus to arrest some. (Acts 9:1-19)

Philippians 3:4b-11

If anyone thinks he has reasons to put confidence in the flesh, I have more: 5 circumcised on the eighth day, of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew of Hebrews; in regard to the law, a Pharisee; 6 as for zeal, persecuting the church; as for legalistic righteousness, faultless.

⁷ But whatever was to my profit I now consider loss for the sake of Christ. ⁸ What is more, I consider everything a loss compared to the surpassing greatness of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord, for whose sake I have lost all things. I consider them rubbish, that I may gain Christ 9 and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but that which is through faith in Christ—the righteousness that comes from God and is by faith. 10 I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the fellowship of sharing in his sufferings, becoming like him in his death, 11 and so, somehow, to attain to the resurrection from the dead.

What was the sanctifying work the Spirit did in Paul's life after Paul put his faith in Jesus? He caused Paul to recognize that he couldn't be righteous on his own. Righteousness only comes through faith in Christ.

GROWING IN HOLINESS

2 Peter 1:3-11

³ His divine power has given us everything we need life and godliness through our knowledge of him who called us by his own glory and goodness. 4 Through these he has given us his very great and precious promises, so that through them you may participate in the divine nature and escape the corruption in the world caused by evil desires.

⁵ For this very reason, make every effort to add to your faith goodness; and to goodness, knowledge; ⁶ and to knowledge, self-control; and to self-control, perseverance; and to perseverance, godliness; ⁷ and to godliness, brotherly kindness; and to brotherly kindness, love. ⁸ For if you possess these qualities in increasing measure, they will keep you from being ineffective and unproductive in your knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. ⁹ But if anyone does not have them, he is nearsighted and blind, and has forgotten that he has been cleansed from his past sins.

¹⁰ Therefore, my brothers, be all the more eager to make your calling and election sure. For if you do these things, you will never fall, 11 and you will receive a rich welcome into the eternal kingdom of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

1. Through what do we gain everything we need for living a good life? (vs. 3) God's divine power through our relationship (real personal knowledge) with Jesus.



2. "Through these" refer to what God called us by, his glory and goodness. What has God given us through his glory and goodness? (vs. 4)

His great and precious promises.

- 3. What do you think is God's greatest and most precious promise?

 Salvation through Christ and the indwelling of his Holy Spirit. (justification and sanctification)
- 4. For what two reasons has he given us his great and precious promises? (vs. 4)

 So we can participate in the divine nature and escape the corruption of the world. (Live in the new nature and put to death the old nature.)
- 5. Peter lists the characteristics of increasing holiness in verses 5-7. What is the first result of increasing in those characteristics? (vs. 8)

They make us effective and productive. (They keep us from being ineffective and unproductive.) We can fulfill God's purposes.

- 6. What have we forgotten about our sins if we fail to increase in holiness? (vs. 9) That we have been greatly forgiven and cleansed from our sin.
- 7. If we've forgotten that we've been cleansed from past sins, how would that affect the way we look at present sins? (vs. 9)

We'd be nearsighted and blind. We wouldn't see them. We'd think of our sin as being an aberration, trivial or just mistakes.

- 8. What will be the two ultimate results if we increase in holiness by doing the listed things? (vs. 10-11) We won't fall and we'll receive a rich welcome into heaven.
- How does increasing in holiness keep us from falling?
 We stay connected to Christ and are filled with his Holy Spirit. We are following Christ and wanting what he wants.

LESSON FOCUS

This lesson focuses on the gifts of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit blesses every believer with unique abilities to bless others. Through this lesson, we are seeking to gain a correct understanding of the purpose and function of the gifts of the Holy Spirit. The Ultimate Outcomes study, What is my Calling?, has three lessons dedicated to understanding more fully the specific gifts of the Spirit and the level of obedience to which all believers are called in each of the gifts.



SEARCHING THE SCRIPTURES



THE GIFTS OF THE SPIRIT

1 Corinthians 12:1-11

¹Now about spiritual gifts, brothers, I do not want you to be ignorant. ²You know that when you were pagans, somehow or other you were influenced and led astray to mute idols. ³Therefore I tell you that no one who is speaking by the Spirit of God says, "Jesus be cursed," and no one can say, "Jesus is Lord," except by the Holy Spirit.

⁴There are different kinds of gifts, but the same Spirit. ⁵There are different kinds of service, but the same Lord. ⁶There are different kinds of working, but the same God works all of them in all men.

⁷Now to each one the manifestation of the Spirit is given for the common good. ⁸To one there is given through the Spirit the message of wisdom, to another the message of knowledge by means of the same Spirit, ⁹to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by that one Spirit, ¹⁰to another miraculous powers, to another prophecy, to another distinguishing between spirits, to another speaking in different kinds of tongues, and to still another the interpretation of tongues. ¹¹All these are the work of one and the same Spirit, and he gives them to each one, just as he determines.

- 1. What is the definition of spiritual gifts? (vs. 7, 11)

 Special spiritual abilities for service given for the common good by the Holy Spirit as he sees fit.
- 2. Who is given spiritual gifts? (vs. 11) Each believer.



THE PURPOSE OF SPIRITUAL GIFTS

1 Corinthians 12:12-21

¹²The body is a unit, though it is made up of many parts; and though all its parts are many, they form one body. So it is with Christ. ¹³For we were all baptized by one Spirit into one body—whether Jews or Greeks, slave or free—and we were all given the one Spirit to drink.

¹⁴Now the body is not made up of one part but of many. ¹⁵If the foot should say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," it would not for that reason cease to be part of the body. ¹⁶And if the ear should say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," it would not for that reason cease to be part of the body. ¹⁷If the whole body were an eye, where would the sense of hearing be? If the whole body were an ear, where would the sense of smell be? ¹⁸But in fact God has arranged the parts in the body, every one of them, just as he wanted them to be. ¹⁹If they were all one part, where would the body be? ²⁰As it is, there are many parts, but one body.

²¹The eye cannot say to the hand, "I don't need you!" And the head cannot say to the feet, "I don't need you!"

How are spiritual gifts given to function?
 To function as part of the body – gifts can only be understood as they function as one of a group of interdependent body parts that benefit the whole body.



- 2. Why doesn't a spiritual gift have value functioning independently from the body?

 We were designed to function as a body. You can't receive or extend benefit apart from functioning in the body.
- 3. What happens to the individual believer and the body if a gift is not utilized? They both suffer lack. Neither the individual nor the body is built up.
- 4. Why doesn't the Holy Spirit give each believer all the gifts?

 We wouldn't need each other. We wouldn't function together as parts of one body.



THE VALUE OF SPIRITUAL GIFTS

1 Corinthians 13:1-13

¹If I speak in the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal. ²If I have the gift of prophecy and can fathom all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have a faith that can move mountains, but have not love, I am nothing. ³If I give all I possess to the poor and surrender my body to the flames but have not love, I gain nothing.

⁴Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. ⁵It is not rude, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. ⁶Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. ⁷It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres.

⁸Love never fails. But where there are prophecies, they will cease; where there are tongues, they will be stilled; where there is knowledge, it will pass away. ⁹For we know in part and we prophesy in part, ¹⁰but when perfection comes, the imperfect disappears. ¹¹When I was a child, I talked like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child. When I became a man, I put childish ways behind me. ¹²Now we see but a poor reflection as in a mirror; then we shall see face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I am fully known.

¹³And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love.

- 1. When are our spiritual gifts worthless? (vs. 1-3) If love is absent the gift is worthless.
- 2. In the end, what will happen to all the gifts? (vs. 9) They will pass away and cease.

Why? They are imperfect and won't be needed when the perfect comes.

1 John 3:16

¹⁶ This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down his life for us. And we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers and sisters.

3. What is love?

Christ's example of love was the sacrificial giving of himself for our benefit. Love is putting the interests of others above our own interests and responding rightly to them.



- 4. What is it about love that makes the gifts valuable? They aren't used to bring glory to self. They always have the best interest of others at heart. Self-interest doesn't enter the equation.
- 5. Can people still function in a gift even if they don't have love? Yes, to some degree, but it won't have the impact God intends on either the giver or recipient. It won't build up the body.

THINKING IT THROUGH



THE CORRECT PERSPECTIVE OF SPIRITUAL GIFTS

The gifts of the Spirit are individual gifts of spiritual empowerment to be used as part of the body to build up the body of Christ. They are gifts given by the Holy Spirit in service to the body of Christ for the common good of the whole church.

- 1. What would be a misuse of the gifts of the Spirit? If the purpose of spiritual gifts is for the common good, then any use that hurts the body is a misuse. If gifts are used for personal gain or glory that is a misuse. If someone avoids using a gift that is a misuse.
- 2. What are misuses of the spiritual gifts born out of? Misuses are born out of being self-focused rather than God-focused, to edify self rather than edify the body. Motivations can be different depending on sin nature.
- 3. What are some controversies surrounding the gifts of tongues?
 - Tongues have ceased (The idea is that the perfect came with the canonization of Scripture, therefore tongues have ceased. If this were the case, you would have to say that prophecy and knowledge have also ceased.)
 - Must speak in tongues to be saved. Salvation is based in faith, not the gifts.
 - Tongues are evidence of the filling of the Holy Spirit.
- 4. What is the true evidence of a Spirit-filled life? The fruit of the Spirit: love, joy, peace, longsuffering, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control.
- 5. What is salvation based on? Belief in Jesus and the work he did on the cross on our behalf.





A SPIRITUAL GIFT - MARTY'S EXPERIENCE

I have often thought that the natural abilities that God gave me were spiritual gifts. Sometimes I think it is hard to know the difference as God does use our natural abilities to build up and encourage others. Also, in each of the spiritual gifts there is a basic level of obedience that we as Christians have been called to, so we have a degree of accountability in each of them.

A spiritual gift is one that is supernaturally given. In my own life I became aware of being given the gift of faith when I knew that my ability to trust God wasn't of me, but was given to me to encourage others. For a long time I wasn't aware that it was a gift and couldn't understand when other people weren't able to trust God. We all struggle with pride and have a tendency to judge other people in areas of our own giftedness.

It was the gift of faith given to me that enabled me to encourage my husband to complete seminary. A lack of money caused him to think that he would have to quit to provide for his family. I was able to encourage him to continue on, believing that God was faithful and would provide what was needed. God was faithful and did provide what was needed in amazing, supernatural ways. At that time I didn't recognize my faith as a gift.

When I faced brain surgery to have a tumor removed from my pituitary gland, the gift of faith became very evident to me. As I contemplated what could happen to me and therefore to my five children (one of whom was a newborn), I knew I had to completely trust God. I had to believe that my children were in God's hands, no matter what happened to me. Romans 8:28 echoed in my mind. "And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose."

I had a choice to believe either God is who he says he is, or he isn't. I knew that I didn't want to live life without God being who he says. Being able to believe God was a gift that was given to me. My faith has been steadfast ever since, because of him not me. It didn't waver during my husband's illness and death and it hasn't wavered since. As I rely on God, faith keeps me from being subject to worry and anxiety.

Faith is a gift God has given to me to see me and my family through difficult times, but also to build up the family of believers. On top of that it has been a witness to those who don't know Jesus. My faith is not of me but a blessed gift to share with and encourage others.

What can you learn from Marty's experience in terms of her spiritual gift?

Answers will vary. We aren't always aware of how we have been gifted. Believing God is a choice.





A SPIRITUAL GIFT - THE APOSTLE PETER'S EXPERIENCE

Acts 3:1-10

One day Peter and John were going up to the temple at the time of prayer—at three in the afternoon. ² Now a man who was lame from birth was being carried to the temple gate called Beautiful, where he was put every day to beg from those going into the temple courts. 3 When he saw Peter and John about to enter, he asked them for money. ⁴ Peter looked straight at him, as did John. Then Peter said, "Look at us!" ⁵ So the man gave them his attention, expecting to get something from them.

⁶ Then Peter said, "Silver or gold I do not have, but what I do have I give you. In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, walk." ⁷ Taking him by the right hand, he helped him up, and instantly the man's feet and ankles became strong. 8 He jumped to his feet and began to walk. Then he went with them into the temple courts, walking and jumping, and praising God. 9 When all the people saw him walking and praising God, ¹⁰ they recognized him as the same man who used to sit begging at the temple gate called Beautiful, and they were filled with wonder and amazement at what had happened to him.

What can you learn from Peter's exercise of a spiritual gift? Answers will vary. Peter shared what he had been given. Not only was the beggar healed, but people were amazed. It had a positive impact on everyone and glory was given to God.

THE SPIRIT'S PURPOSE

Ephesians 4:1-16

¹As a prisoner for the Lord, then, I urge you to live a life worthy of the calling you have received. ²Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in love. ³Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace. ⁴There is one body and one Spirit—just as you were called to one hope when you were called— ⁵one Lord, one faith, one baptism; ⁶one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all.

⁷But to each one of us grace has been given as Christ apportioned it. ⁸This is why it says: "When he ascended on high, he led captives in his train and gave gifts to men." (What does "he ascended" mean except that he also descended to the lower, earthly regions? ¹⁰He who descended is the very one who ascended higher than all the heavens, in order to fill the whole universe.) 11 It was he who gave some to be apostles, some to be prophets, some to be evangelists, and some to be pastors and teachers, ¹²to prepare God's people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up 13 until we all reach unity in the faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God and become mature, attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ.

¹⁴Then we will no longer be infants, tossed back and forth by the waves, and blown here and there by every wind of teaching and by the cunning and craftiness of men in their deceitful scheming. ¹⁵Instead, speaking the truth in love, we will in all things grow up into him who is the Head, that is, Christ. ¹⁶From him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work.



- 1. We each have received a different portion for the same purpose. What is God's purpose for us together? (vs. 13) To be brought to complete perfection, to become mature and attain the whole measure of the fullness of Christ.
- 2. Why can't God's purpose for us as individual be realized outside of functioning within the body? We need one another to be complete and fulfill God's purpose for the church.
- 3. What is the implication of that for Christians who say they don't need to be part of a church? They are missing out on God's good design and what he deems best. They won't experience his blessing nor will they bless others. They won't attain the fullness of Christ.

TWO OPPOSING NATURES

Galatians 5:16-26

¹⁶So I say, live by the Spirit, and you will not gratify the desires of the sinful nature. ¹⁷For the sinful nature desires what is contrary to the Spirit, and the Spirit what is contrary to the sinful nature. They are in conflict with each other, so that you do not do what you want. ¹⁸But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not under law.

¹⁹The acts of the sinful nature are obvious: sexual immorality, impurity and debauchery; ²⁰idolatry and witchcraft; hatred, discord, jealousy, fits of rage, selfish ambition, dissensions, factions ²¹ and envy; drunkenness,



orgies, and the like. I warn you, as I did before, that those who live like this will not inherit the kingdom of God.

22 But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, 23 gentleness and self-control. Against such things there is no law. 24 Those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the sinful nature with its passions and desires. 25 Since we live by the Spirit, let us keep in step with the Spirit. 26 Let us not become conceited, provoking and envying each other.

Colossians 3:12-13

¹² Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience. ¹³ Bear with each other and forgive whatever grievances you may have against one another. Forgive as the Lord forgave you.

- What is the main idea of the passage from Galatians?
 There are two natures by which men live. Our behavior is born out of our nature. You follow one or the other.
 If you follow one, you leave the other behind. Sinful nature = flesh, Spiritual nature = Spirit

4. How does the passage from Galatians describe those who belong to Christ? (vs. 24)

They have crucified the sinful nature with its passions and desires. It is an intentional act/effort, what you chose to focus on and lead you.

What is the result? (vs. 25)
They now live by the Spirit and produce good fruit.

5. Can we produce the work of the flesh and the fruit of the Spirit at the same time? No, they are contrary to each other



Illustration: The heating and air conditioning systems in a house share the same ducts. However, cool air and hot air don't come out of the system together; it's one or the other.

6. Why do people want to give themselves over to their sinful nature?

It doesn't require effort or self-control. It is our default mode. It feels good in the short run.

Matthew 7:15-20

- "Watch out for false prophets. They come to you in sheep's clothing, but inwardly they are ferocious wolves.
 By their fruit you will recognize them. Do people pick grapes from thornbushes, or figs from thistles?
 Likewise, every good tree bears good fruit, but a bad tree bears bad fruit. A good tree cannot bear bad fruit, and a bad tree cannot bear good fruit. Every tree that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire.
 Thus, by their fruit you will recognize them.
- Why is it important to be concerned about the fruit our lives produce?
 It is evidence of which nature we are being led by. The outcome of our life will be determined by the nature we are led by.
- 2. Can the fruit of the Spirit be faked? Explain.

 Some but not all for a short period of time under some circumstances. It can't be sustained as at some point what is real becomes evident. Increase needs to become evident.

THINKING IT THROUGH



EXEMPLIFYING THE FRUIT OF THE SPIRIT - STEPHEN

Stephen, a disciple of Jesus, fearlessly shared the truth about Jesus and upset the Jewish religious leaders by accusing them of killing him. That led to them stoning him to death.

Acts 7:54-60

⁵⁴ When the members of the Sanhedrin heard this [what Stephen said], they were furious and gnashed their teeth at him. 55 But Stephen, full of the Holy Spirit, looked up to heaven and saw the glory of God, and Jesus standing at the right hand of God. 56 "Look," he said, "I see heaven open and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God."

⁵⁷ At this they covered their ears and, yelling at the top of their voices, they all rushed at him, ⁵⁸ dragged him out of the city and began to stone him. Meanwhile, the witnesses laid their coats at the feet of a young man named Saul.

⁵⁹ While they were stoning him, Stephen prayed, "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit." ⁶⁰ Then he fell on his knees and cried out, "Lord, do not hold this sin against them." When he had said this, he fell asleep.

What is evidence that Stephen was filled with the Spirit and demonstrating the fruit of that? He had God's peace and joy in an awful situation. He forgave the people who killed him. The fruit of the Spirit was exemplified in his life.



EXEMPLIFYING THE FRUIT OF THE SPIRIT - THE APOSTLE PAUL

Acts 20:17-24

¹⁷ From Miletus, Paul sent to Ephesus for the elders of the church. ¹⁸ When they arrived, he said to them: "You know how I lived the whole time I was with you, from the first day I came into the province of Asia. ¹⁹ I served the Lord with great humility and with tears although I was severely tested by the plots of the Jews. ²⁰ You know that I have not hesitated to preach anything that would be helpful to you but have taught you publicly and from house to house. ²¹ I have declared to both Jews and Greeks that they must turn to God in repentance and have faith in our Lord Jesus.

²² "And now, compelled by the Spirit, I am going to Jerusalem, not knowing what will happen to me there. ²³ I only know that in every city the Holy Spirit warns me that prison and hardships are facing me. ²⁴ However, I consider my life worth nothing to me; if only I may finish the race and complete the task the Lord Jesus has given me—the task of testifying to the gospel of God's grace.

What shows that Paul was filled with the Holy Spirit? His faithfulness in sharing the Gospel and his willingness to suffer for Christ.



CONCLUDING THOUGHTS



MIMPROVING FRUIT QUALITY

John 15:1-5

¹"I am the true vine, and my Father is the gardener. ²He cuts off every branch in me that bears no fruit, while every branch that does bear fruit he prunes so that it will be even more fruitful. ³You are already clean because of the word I have spoken to you. ⁴Remain in me, and I will remain in you. No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear fruit unless you remain in me.

⁵"I am the vine; you are the branches. If a man remains in me and I in him, he will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing.

- 1. What must we do to improve the fruit our lives produce? Abide in Christ. We have to be connected to the vine. Let the work be done in us that needs to be done. We submit to pruning and disciplin.
- 2. How do we commonly view self-improvement? We think it is by our own self-effort. We focus on changing our actions.



Note: Good fruit cannot be produced through self-reform. It isn't the consequence of direct effort; it's the natural consequence of being connected to Christ. The work that needs to be done on our part is to remain in Christ and yield to his pruning.

LESSON FOCUS

If we want the product of our life to be the fruit of the Spirit, then our life must be filled with the Spirit. The focus of this lesson is on being filled with the Spirit. If you say a person is full of himself, what does that mean? Thoughts about himself and what benefits him are what drive his actions.

How would that contrast with being filled with the Spirit? Thoughts about God and wanting what God wants would drive his actions.

SEARCHING THE SCRIPTURES



BE FILLED WITH THE SPIRIT

Ephesians 5:15-2

¹⁵Be very careful, then, how you live—not as unwise but as wise, ¹⁶making the most of every opportunity, because the days are evil. ¹⁷Therefore do not be foolish, but understand what the Lord's will is. ¹⁸Do not get drunk on wine, which leads to debauchery. Instead, be filled with the Spirit. 19 Speak to one another with psalms, hymns and spiritual songs. Sing and make music in your heart to the Lord, ²⁰always giving thanks to God the Father for everything, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.



- 1. What is drunkenness like and what does that teach us about being filled with the Spirit? (vs. 18) If you are drunk, you are completely under the influence of alcohol. It is what controls you and leads to debauchery. If you are filled with the Spirit, you are saturated with the Spirit of God and full of praise and gratitude.
- 2. Why should we care about living Spirit-filled lives?

 It is the only way we will bring honor to God, be wise, worship God in a worthy manner, edify one another, and be grateful. Since the days are evil, it is the only way we will survive them well.



Note: In the passage, "be filled with the Spirit" is a command in the present passive tense. Since it is passive, it indicates it is something that is done to us as we open ourselves up to it. God is waiting and willing to do something to us. We are to yield to his work. We don't fill ourselves, God fills us. Since it is in the present tense we are to yield to it each and every day. It is not something done once in the past.



PUT ON THE NEW SELF

Ephesians 4:22-24

²²You were taught, with regard to your former way of life, to put off your old self, which is being corrupted by its deceitful desires; ²³to be made new in the attitude of your minds; ²⁴and to put on the new self, created to be like God in true righteousness and holiness.

- What is the old self?
 The nature we are born with that is controlled by the flesh and deceitful desires.
- 2. What does it mean to put off the old self?

 We turn away from the flesh. We stop being led by deceitful desires, not yielding to the flesh. We take off what belongs to the old nature and we don't have anything to do with it.
- 3. What is the new self?

 The one God created us to be. The one that reflects his holiness and his image.
- 4. How do we put on the new self?
 You first have to take off the old. We want what God wants and are made new in the attitude of our minds.
 We have the mind of Christ. God works in us and transforms us into the likeness of Christ.

Note: The picture here is one of undressing and dressing. We have to take off the old set of clothes to be able to put on the new. We can't put on the new without getting rid of the old.





1 John 1:5-2:6

⁵This is the message we have heard from him and declare to you: God is light; in him there is no darkness at all. ⁶If we claim to have fellowship with him yet walk in the darkness, we lie and do not live by the truth. ⁷But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus, his Son, purifies us from all sin.

⁸If we claim to be without sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us. ⁹If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness. ¹⁰If we claim we have not sinned, we make him out to be a liar and his word has no place in our lives.

2My dear children, I write this to you so that you will not sin. But if anybody does sin, we have one who speaks to the Father in our defense—Jesus Christ, the Righteous One. ²He is the atoning sacrifice for our sins, and not only for ours but also for the sins of the whole world.

³We know that we have come to know him if we obey his commands. ⁴The man who says, "I know him," but does not do what he commands is a liar, and the truth is not in him. ⁵But if anyone obeys his word, God's love is truly made complete in him. This is how we know we are in him: ⁶Whoever claims to live in him must walk as Jesus did.

- Why don't Christians continually live perfect, Spirit-filled lives?
 We often walk in the flesh and sin. We are not wholly sanctified; we are in a process of progressive sanctification. Darkness is comfortable because we don't have to look at our sin.
- How do we remain filled with the Spirit?
 We uncover any sin that separates us from God, confess it and walk in the light. Confession and repentance keeps the Spirit working in us.



Note: Sanctification is the process of being made holy by the work of the Holy Spirit in us. The more we yield to the Spirit, the more sanctified we become. The more we want what God wants the less we will sin. We won't be wholly sanctified until we enter heaven.

3. Jesus was not only fully God he was also fully man. Thinking about his being fully man, why was he without sin?

He was filled with Spirit and only wanted what the Father wanted. His will was to do the Father's will.



THINKING IT THROUGH



THE FILLING OF THE HOLY SPIRIT - THE APOSTLE PETER

On the night Jesus was arrested, Peter denied three times that he even knew Jesus. Just a short time later, filled with the Holy Spirit, Peter was a different person.

Acts 4:18-147

⁸ Then Peter, filled with the Holy Spirit, said to them: "Rulers and elders of the people! 9 If we are being called to account today for an act of kindness shown to a cripple and are asked how he was healed, 10 then know this, you and all the people of Israel: It is by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom you crucified but whom God raised from the dead, that this man stands before you healed. 11 He is "'the stone you builders rejected, which has become the capstone.' 12 Salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given to men by which we must be saved."

¹³ When they saw the courage of Peter and John and realized that they were unschooled, ordinary men, they were astonished and they took note that these men had been with Jesus. 14 But since they could see the man who had been healed standing there with them, there was nothing they could say. 15 So they ordered them to withdraw from the Sanhedrin and then conferred together. 16 "What are we going to do with these men?" they asked. "Everyone living in Jerusalem knows they have done an outstanding miracle, and we cannot deny it. ¹⁷ But to stop this thing from spreading any further among the people, we must warn these men to speak no longer to anyone in this name."

What did the filling of Peter with the Holy Spirit accomplish? Peter spoke with power and astonished the leaders. He and John were courageous. The gospel spread.

THE RULES FOR HOLY LIVING

Colossians 3:1-17

¹Since, then, you have been raised with Christ, set your hearts on things above, where Christ is seated at the right hand of God. ²Set your minds on things above, not on earthly things. ³For you died, and your life is now hidden with Christ in God. ⁴When Christ, who is your life, appears, then you also will appear with him in glory.

⁵Put to death, therefore, whatever belongs to your earthly nature: sexual immorality, impurity, lust, evil desires and greed, which is idolatry. ⁶Because of these, the wrath of God is coming. ⁷You used to walk in these ways, in the life you once lived. ⁸But now you must rid yourselves of all such things as these: anger, rage, malice, slander, and filthy language from your lips. ⁹Do not lie to each other, since you have taken off your old self with its practices ¹⁰ and have put on the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge in the image of its Creator. "Here there is no Greek or Jew, circumcised or uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave or free, but Christ is all, and is in all.



¹²Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience. ¹³Bear with each other and forgive whatever grievances you may have against one another. Forgive as the Lord forgave you. ¹⁴And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity.

¹⁵Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, since as members of one body you were called to peace. And be thankful. ¹⁶Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom, and as you sing psalms, hymns and spiritual songs with gratitude in your hearts to God. ¹⁷And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him.

What are the six rules for holy living that come from being Spirit-filled and what does each mean we do?

1. (vs. 1-2) Set your heart and mind on things above.

Meaning: Want what God wants. Think about God.

2. (vs. 5) Put to death your earthly nature.

Meaning: Die to deceitful desires. Turn away from the world.

3. (vs. 10) Put on the new self.

Meaning: Be transformed into Christ's likeness. Produce fruit.

4. (vs. 15) Let the peace of Christ rule in your heart.

Meaning: When there is no peace, be open to the conviction of sin.



Note: The word for rule is brabuo, which is a sporting term relating to the function of an umpire. The presence or absence of the peace of Christ in us shows us whether we are doing what is right or not.

5. (vs. 16) Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly.

Meaning: Be filled with God's word and led by his truth. Function in the body.

6. (vs. 17) Do everything in the name of Jesus.

Meaning: With gratitude, act as Christ's representative in everything you say or do.

What will following the rules for holy living show about us?
We want what Christ wants and belong to him. We are filled with his Spirit and able to do what brings honor and glory to him.

WARNINGS CONCERNING THE SPIRIT



INTRODUCTION



Lesson 1 - Who Is the Spirit?

Because the Holt Spirit is a person, he has a m <u>mind</u> , w <u>will</u> and e <u>emotion</u> .
Since the Holy Spirit is a person rather than an impersonal f <u>force</u> , we need to conform to his
wwill rather than try to get him to c conform to our will.
Lesson 2 – The Work of the Holy Spirit in the World
Jesus referred to the Holy Spirit as the paraclete. The word paraclete means a llegal
c <u>counselor</u> . A good legal counselor advises his client of two things: his l <u>legal</u>
d <u>dilemma</u> and the best l <u>legal</u> r <u>remedy</u> .

LESSON FOCUS

Holy Spirit.

This lesson looks at warnings concerning the Holy Spirit. Why is it important to have a right attitude toward God's Spirit? We can't function rightly without a right attitude. We have to realize our need and what it takes to be filled with the Spirit. He is a person that we can please or displease. He has a will for my life. My sanctification is dependent upon my submission to his work.

SEARCHING THE SCRIPTURES



THE THREE WARNINGS CONCERNING THE SPIRIT

1 Thessalonians 5:19 – Do not put out the Spirit's fire.

Ephesians 4:30 - Do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God.

Matthew 12:31 – Blasphemy against the Spirit will not be forgiven.



Note: The context surrounding this warning is that the teachers of the law attributed Jesus' healings to Satan's power rather than to the Holy Spirit.

What does it mean to quench the Spirit?
 Put the fire out. Literally, put out our passion, dump water on fire.
 Passive – let the fire go out by not listening, cold toward the Spirit, not open defiance.



- 2. What does it mean to grieve the Spirit?

 To cause to feel pain. Actively disobey the Spirit, walking in resistance to the Spirit's will, actively and willfully opposing his will
- 3. What does it mean to blaspheme the Spirit?

 Continual denial of the work of Christ, rejecting God's Spirit in the face of the evidence, nothing in the heart that is responsive to God, persistence in sin. Attributing something of God to something else.

 Rejecting his person and testimony that is evident in creation. Calling him a liar.

4. How do the warnings concerning the Spirit relate to each other?

They are progressive in their levels of defiance against God, starting with passive resistance and ending with total denial.

THINKING IT THROUGH



ANANIAS AND SAPPIRA

Acts 5:1-11

- ⁵ Now a man named Ananias, together with his wife Sapphira, also sold a piece of property. ² With his wife's full knowledge he kept back part of the money for himself, but brought the rest and put it at the apostles' feet.
- ³ Then Peter said, "Ananias, how is it that Satan has so filled your heart that you have lied to the Holy Spirit and have kept for yourself some of the money you received for the land? ⁴ Didn't it belong to you before it was sold? And after it was sold, wasn't the money at your disposal? What made you think of doing such a thing? You have not lied just to men but to God."
- ⁵ When Ananias heard this, he fell down and died. And great fear seized all who heard what had happened. ⁶ Then the young men came forward, wrapped up his body, and carried him out and buried him.
- ⁷ About three hours later his wife came in, not knowing what had happened. ⁸ Peter asked her, "Tell me, is this the price you and Ananias got for the land?"
 - "Yes," she said, "that is the price."
- ⁹ Peter said to her, "How could you agree to test the Spirit of the Lord? Look! The feet of the men who buried your husband are at the door, and they will carry you out also."
- ¹⁰ At that moment she fell down at his feet and died. Then the young men came in and, finding her dead, carried her out and buried her beside her husband. 11 Great fear seized the whole church and all who heard about these events.

What can we learn about the Holy Spirit from the account of Ananias and Sapphira? The Spirit cannot be deceived. There are dire consequences if we act as though we are following the Spirit but instead are just doing what we want. Hypocrisy will be uncovered.





SIMON THE SORCERER

Acts 8:9-24

⁹ Now for some time a man named Simon had practiced sorcery in the city and amazed all the people of Samaria. He boasted that he was someone great, 10 and all the people, both high and low, gave him their attention and exclaimed, "This man is the divine power known as the Great Power." 11 They followed him because he had amazed them for a long time with his magic. 12 But when they believed Philip as he preached the good news of the kingdom of God and the name of Jesus Christ, they were baptized, both men and women. ¹³ Simon himself believed and was baptized. And he followed Philip everywhere, astonished by the great signs and miracles he saw.

¹⁴ When the apostles in Jerusalem heard that Samaria had accepted the word of God, they sent Peter and John to them. 15 When they arrived, they prayed for them that they might receive the Holy Spirit, 16 because the Holy Spirit had not yet come upon any of them; they had simply been baptized into the name of the Lord Jesus. ¹⁷ Then Peter and John placed their hands on them, and they received the Holy Spirit.

¹⁸ When Simon saw that the Spirit was given at the laying on of the apostles' hands, he offered them money ¹⁹ and said, "Give me also this ability so that everyone on whom I lay my hands may receive the Holy Spirit.

 20 Peter answered: "May your money perish with you, because you thought you could buy the gift of God with money! ²¹ You have no part or share in this ministry, because your heart is not right before God. ²² Repent of this wickedness and pray to the Lord. Perhaps he will forgive you for having such a thought in your heart. ²³ For I see that you are full of bitterness and captive to sin."

²⁴ Then Simon answered, "Pray to the Lord for me so that nothing you have said may happen to me."

What can we learn from the account of Simon?

The Holy Spirit is a gift that is given to believers. It is not earned or bought. It isn't a force we can seek to use for our own desires. Our heart needs to be right to receive it. We need to examine ourselves to uncover anything that is not right and will keep us from receiving God's gift.

CONCLUDING THOUGHTS



GOD'S GIFT TO THE WORLD

The Bible warns us not to fail to receive from God what he offers through his Spirit. In the broadest sense what the Spirit offers can be captured by the two concepts of law and grace. God's law is the standard God has given us so we can know how we should live. God's grace is given to us as a means for us to be restored to his standard when we break his law.

John 1:17

¹⁷ For the law was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ.



The equation of God's gifts to the world:

law + grace = eternal life no law + no grace = death

If you have no law, you have no g guidance

If you have no grace, you have no r <u>restoration</u>

1. How has God's law impacted your life?

2. How has God's grace impacted your life?

It is by his grace that I am forgiven. He has given me his Spirit which enables me to live by his law.

 Testimony and regeneration. God's Spirit works to bring the world and the church into the conformity of his will.
- 2. If God is all powerful, why is evil that opposes his will still in existence? God's will is for men to freely choose to submit to his will out of their love for him. He doesn't impose his will from the outside. Evil has already been conquered through Christ. He has provided a way for us to escape it.



LESSON FOCUS

This lesson looks at three things the Holy Spirit promises to work in the lives of believers: baptism, indwelling and sealing.

SEARCHING THE SCRIPTURES



THE BAPTISM OF THE SPIRIT

Ephesians 4:4-6

⁴ There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to one hope when you were called; ⁵ one Lord, one faith, one baptism; ⁶ one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all.



1 Corinthians 12:12-13

¹²The body is a unit, though it is made up of many parts; and though all its parts are many, they form one body. So it is with Christ. ¹³For we were all baptized by one Spirit into one body—whether Jews or Greeks, slave or free—and we were all given the one Spirit to drink.



Note: There are two types of baptism: water and spiritual. Water baptism comes after a profession of faith in Jesus and visually demonstrates our participation in his death and resurrection through the dying to self (going under the water) and coming alive in Christ (being raised up out of the water). Spiritual baptism marks the beginning of personal, spiritual regeneration through the indwelling of the Holy Spirit, uniting all believers as one in Christ.

3. As part of the organism, the body of Christ, how should we relate to our head, Christ, and to the other parts of the body, our fellow believers?

The head leads and is to be obeyed by all the parts.

The body is made up of interdependent parts, all needed, all responsible to contribute and benefit one another.





THE INDWELLING OF THE SPIRIT

Romans 8:9-11

⁹You, however, are controlled not by the sinful nature but by the Spirit, if the Spirit of God lives in you. And if anyone does not have the Spirit of Christ, he does not belong to Christ. ¹⁰But if Christ is in you, your body is dead because of sin, yet your spirit is alive because of righteousness. ¹¹And if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies through his Spirit, who lives in you.

1 Corinthians 6:19-20

¹⁹Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit, who is in you, whom you have received from God? You are not your own; ²⁰you were bought at a price. Therefore honor God with your body.

Galatians 4:6

⁶Because you are sons, God sent the Spirit of his Son into our hearts, the Spirit who calls out, "Abba, Father."

- What does it mean to have the indwelling of the Holy Spirit?
 Have the life-giving Spirit of God living in you, The body is God's temple and God dwells in his house.
 It establishes our familial relationship to God. Brings us from a dead state to an alive one. We are able to discern and live out spiritual truth.
- How does our sin affect the Holy Spirit living in us?
 Our sin shuts the Spirit out so his work changes from conforming and empowering us to convicting us of our sin.
- 3. What are the benefits of the indwelling of the Holy Spirit? Communion with Christ, understanding and power to live rightly, power to be free from our sinful nature, part of a body/family, dead to sin, alive to righteousness.



THE SEALING OF THE SPIRIT

2 Corinthians 1:21-22

²¹Now it is God who makes both us and you stand firm in Christ. He anointed us, ²²set his seal of ownership on us, and put his Spirit in our hearts as a deposit, guaranteeing what is to come.

Ephesians 1:13-14

¹³And you also were included in Christ when you heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation. Having believed, you were marked in him with a seal, the promised Holy Spirit, ¹⁴who is a deposit guaranteeing our inheritance until the redemption of those who are God's possession—to the praise of his glory.

Ephesians 4:30

³⁰And do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God, with whom you were sealed for the day of redemption.



What does it mean to be sealed by the Spirit?
 Guarantee of future results, proves the inheritance that we have in Christ. The Spirit guarantees our salvation, not our own effort.



Illustration: When a letter is placed in an envelope, the envelope is sealed and sent to a address. The content of the sealed envelope doesn't change as it travels to its intended destination.

- What is the significance of being sealed by the Spirit?
 Total security in our future hope. We can feel secure in his love and power and not be dependent upon our circumstances.
- 3. What is the responsibility of being sealed by the Spirit?

 To live according to the Spirit, to stand firm in Christ and his promises, not to use security as a reason to sin. Honor God and not grieve him.

THINKING IT THROUGH



WARNINGS IN THE BOOK OF REVELATION

How do Christ's warnings to the following churches relate to the promised work of the Holy Spirit?

1. Baptism – Ephesus Revelation 2:4-5

⁴ Yet I hold this against you: You have forsaken the love you had at first. ⁵ Consider how far you have fallen! Repent and do the things you did at first. If you do not repent, I will come to you and remove your lampstand from its place.

The church was not being regenerated because they had forsaken being united to the love of Christ. They were quenching the Spirit.

2. Indwelling – Sardis Revelation 3:1-3

¹These are the words of him who holds the seven spirits of God and the seven stars. I know your deeds; you have a reputation of being alive, but you are dead. ² Wake up! Strengthen what remains and is about to die, for I have found your deeds unfinished in the sight of my God. ³ Remember, therefore, what you have received and heard; hold it fast, and repent. But if you do not wake up, I will come like a thief, and you will not know at what time I will come to you.

Their actions weren't coming out of the indwelling of the Holy Spirit but their own strength. They weren't really alive. They were grieving the Spirit.





Note: The seven spirits are listed in Isaiah 11:1-2. There are seven aspects of one complete Holy Spirit.

A shoot will come up from the stump of Jesse; from his roots a Branch will bear fruit.² The Spirit of the LORD will rest on him—the Spirit of wisdom and of understanding, the Spirit of counsel and of might, the Spirit of the knowledge and fear of the LORD.

3. Sealing – Philadelphia Revelation 3:8-10

⁸ I know your deeds. See, I have placed before you an open door that no one can shut. I know that you have little strength, yet you have kept my word and have not denied my name. ⁹ I will make those who are of the synagogue of Satan, who claim to be Jews though they are not, but are liars—I will make them come and fall down at your feet and acknowledge that I have loved you. ¹⁰ Since you have kept my command to endure patiently, I will also keep you from the hour of trial that is going to come on the whole world to test the inhabitants of the earth.

They were undergoing great suffering but they were sealed and Christ would see them through it.

CONCLUDING THOUGHTS



THE ESSENCE OF THIS STUDY

The words Paul wrote to the church at Colossae.

Colossians 1:24-29

²⁴ Now I rejoice in what was suffered for you, and I fill up in my flesh what is still lacking in regard to Christ's afflictions, for the sake of his body, which is the church. ²⁵ I have become its servant by the commission God gave me to present to you the word of God in its fullness— ²⁶ the mystery that has been kept hidden for ages and generations, but is now disclosed to the saints. ²⁷ To them God has chosen to make known among the Gentiles the glorious riches of this mystery, which is Christ in you, the hope of glory.

²⁸ We proclaim him, admonishing and teaching everyone with all wisdom, so that we may present everyone perfect in Christ. ²⁹ To this end I labor struggling with all his energy, which so powerfully works in me.



Note: Christ's affliction is presented to the world through our sharing of the gospel and our suffering on his behalf.

How does this passage capture the essence of the whole study on the Holy Spirit? God's Spirit in us gives us the ability to understand, declare and live out his word. The Holy Spirit is bringing us to perfection in Christ that is the hope of glory.
