#15 - The Centurion and the Widow Luke 7:1-17

PICTURES (Note: Inserted in brackets at the appropriate place in the lesson is the number of the picture to show the students.

- 15-1 The Centurion and Jesus
- 15-2 Jesus raising the widow's son

REVIEW (Before teaching lesson)

- <u>Journal Review</u>: Ask students to share an important truth that they learned from their journal readings at home that week. Share some of your own insights.
- <u>Previous Lesson Review:</u> (Use the visual from the last lesson to aid in review) Why are we not to judge others? Why are we to forgive and give to others? Who will a student be like? What does that mean? What are we to do before we try to take a speck of sawdust out of someone else's eye? What does that mean? What is a tree recognized by? What does that mean in terms of people? What does the wise person do with Jesus' teaching? What does the foolish person do with Jesus' teaching?
- Big Question Review: What makes a person wise? Let the students give their answers to the question.
- <u>Bible Verse Review:</u> Matthew 7:24-25 We are to treat others the way we want to be treated.

(²⁴"Therefore everyone who hears these words of mine and puts them into practice is like a wise man who built his house on the rock.) ²⁵The rain came down, the streams rose, and the winds blew and beat against that house; yet it did not fall, because it had its foundation on the rock.

LESSON CONTENT

Note: The Bible verses included in the lesson are from the NIV 1984 edition. The wording of the questions is derived from that version. If another version of the Bible is used, questions may need to be adapted.

Who ruled in Judah where Jesus lived? Judah, the land where Jesus lived, was occupied and controlled by the Roman Empire. The Romans in Judah were soldiers and government officials who told the Jews what to do. Some Jews cooperated with the Romans but most of the Jews hated the Romans and wouldn't have anything to do with them if they could help it.

Who did the Old Testament prophets say would come to the Jews? God would send a Messiah (Savior) to the Jews.

What did the Jews think the Messiah (Savior) would deliver them from? At the time of Jesus, many of the Jews thought the Messiah (Savior) would come to deliver them from the oppression and tyranny of Rome. They didn't recognize that their biggest problem was their own sin and separation from God.

(picture 15-1) In this lesson, a Roman soldier, a centurion who was the leader of 100 men, looked to Jesus to heal his sick servant. He was considered a good man by the Jews who knew him. The fact that he was a Roman didn't stop Jesus from wanting to help him. In fact, Jesus was very impressed by the centurion's faith.

Luke 7:1-6a

¹When Jesus had finished saying all this in the hearing of the people, he entered Capernaum. ²There a centurion's servant, whom his master valued highly, was sick and about to die. ³The centurion heard of Jesus and sent some elders of the Jews to him, asking him to come and heal his servant. ⁴When they came to Jesus, they pleaded earnestly with him, "This man deserves to have you do this, ⁵because he loves our nation and has built our synagogue." ⁶So Jesus went with them.

What caused the Centurion to send for Jesus? His valued servant was sick and he had heard of Jesus. He believed that Jesus had both the power and authority to heal.

Why did the elders of the Jews encourage Jesus to go to him and heal his servant? He was a good man who had done good things for them.

Why do you think the Centurion didn't go to Jesus himself? He probably sent the elders because he thought Jesus would respond to them because they were Jews, but not to him because he was a Roman.

Luke 7:6b-10

He was not far from the house when the centurion sent friends to say to him: "Lord, don't trouble yourself, for I do not deserve to have you come under my roof. ⁷That is why I did not even consider myself worthy to come to you. But say the word, and my servant will be healed. ⁸For I myself am a man under authority, with soldiers under me. I tell this one, 'Go,' and he goes; and that one, 'Come,' and he comes. I say to my servant, 'Do this,' and he does it."

⁹When Jesus heard this, he was amazed at him, and turning to the crowd following him, he said, "I tell you, I have not found such great faith even in Israel." ¹⁰Then the men who had been sent returned to the house and found the servant well.

Why did the centurion say he didn't go to Jesus himself? He didn't consider himself worthy to have Jesus come into his house. He was humble and understood who Jesus was. He didn't think too highly of himself, even though he was an important leader. He must have recognized the special relationship of the Jewish people to God.

What did the centurion believe about Jesus? All Jesus had to do was speak the word and his servant would be healed.

Why did he believe that? He understood what having power and authority enables one to do. He recognized that Jesus was God and had the power and authority to speak and overcome disease.

Why was Jesus amazed at the centurion's faith? Most people thought Jesus had to touch them to be healed. This man believed that Jesus only had to speak and healing would occur. His faith in what Jesus would be able to do surpassed that of the Jews who had a history of God working miracles in their midst.

What do you think was the impact of this healing? It probably opened the eyes of many Romans to see Jesus and made them aware that the Jewish God loved them also and would heal them if they believed. It also showed that Jesus had all power, that the words he spoke caused things to happen. It may have caused the Jews to consider their lack of faith. It shows that actions are evidence of faith.

There are three important things to learn from the Centurion about his character and faith. What do you think they are?

- 1. The Centurion was humble. He recognized he was unworthy of Jesus showing him favor.
- 2. He had faith in Jesus and his power to heal which means he saw Jesus for who he really is.
- 3. He knew he could ask Jesus to show him favor. He knew the heart of God.

The Gospel of Luke continues with another healing.

Luke 7:11-17 (picture 15-2)

¹¹Soon afterward, Jesus went to a town called Nain, and his disciples and a large crowd went along with him. ¹²As he approached the town gate, a dead person was being carried out—the only son of his mother, and she was a widow. And a large crowd from the town was with her. ¹³When the Lord saw her, his heart went out to her and he said, "Don't cry."

¹⁴Then he went up and touched the coffin, and those carrying it stood still. He said, "Young man, I say to you, get up!" ¹⁵The dead man sat up and began to talk, and Jesus gave him back to his mother.

¹⁶They were all filled with awe and praised God. "A great prophet has appeared among us," they said. "God has come to help his people." ¹⁷This news about Jesus spread throughout Judea and the surrounding country.

<u>What happened when Jesus saw the widow?</u> His heart went out to her. He felt her pain. <u>What does that tell you about Jesus?</u> He grieves over our suffering and the condition of our lives.

How did Jesus bring the young man back to life? He touched the coffin and spoke. Again, he didn't touch the man. What does that show about Jesus? Life resides in Jesus. He is God. No one but God can restore life. He has the power and authority to do so.

How is healing a person different from bringing a person back to life? There is a large difference in degree. Life is still in a person who is healed. Also, the body most often heals itself of disease. That is part of the design of creation. Once life is gone, however, it is gone. The body cannot bring itself back to life again. God is the source of life. Once God brought forth life, the design is that life has to come from life; it doesn't come out of something that has just died even though everything needed for life is still physically there.

How did the people respond to what Jesus did? First they were filled with awe and praised God. Then they considered Jesus to be a great prophet who God had sent to help them. They still didn't understand the fullness of who Jesus is. He didn't match their idea of what the Messiah would be like.

In the lesson when Jesus healed the paralytic we talked about how healings and miracles showed that Jesus is God and has the power and authority to forgive sin. It is easy to believe or have faith at the moment of the miraculous. When is it hard to hold on to faith? In the midst of struggles when it seems one is alone and God isn't working on one's behalf.

How does one maintain faith when there are no miracles or tangible evidence that God is at work? We have to stand on God's promises and remember who he is and what he has already done. We can't focus on circumstances; we have to hold on to the hope of the eternal and understand the nature of God.

Hebrews 11:6 speaks about faith: And without faith it is impossible to please God, because anyone who comes to him must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who earnestly seek him.

<u>How does faith please God?</u> Faith shows that you believe what God has revealed about himself through his word and his creation. You trust him to be who he says he is.

What is the result of faith? You please God. His favor is with you. If you earnestly seek him, he rewards you.

What kind of reward does faith bring? Besides eternal life, It brings God's pleasure, a right relationship and closeness to God and the benefit of doing things his way here on earth.

LESSON WRAP-UP

- Overview Questions: Who was the centurion? Why did he send for Jesus? What did he tell Jesus before Jesus got to his house? Why was Jesus amazed at the centurion? What did Jesus do for the widow? Why did he do that?
- <u>Thought Questions</u>: What is evidence of your faith? How has evidence of someone else's faith impacted you?
- <u>Prayer:</u> Thank Jesus he is your Savior and that he has revealed the fullness of God to people. Pray that you would truly believe all that he is and has said and that your faith would increase. Pray that the way you respond to difficulties would be evidence of your faith.
- <u>The Big Question:</u> What is faith? Let the students give their answers to the question. Share the memory verse. Ask how it answers the question.
- Memory Verse: Hebrews 11:6
 Faith is believing God.

ACTIVITIES (Completed after the lesson)

Any age appropriate activity can be included which fits into the class time. The activities with a star are included on the class notes.

★ <u>Lesson Notes:</u> Ask the students to summarize in one sentence what the lesson was about. Then have them give three main points covered in the lesson. An example is below.

What did you learn from this lesson? How can you put into practice what you learned?

- ★ Memory Verse: Read the memory verse on the cover of the booklet and then have the students fill in the blanks in the verse in the inside.
- ★ This Week's Big Question: Have the students fill in the blanks for the way the memory verse answers the big question.

 Faith is believing God.
- ★ Coloring Page: Color the lesson picture.
- <u>Craft:</u> Roman Soldier Puppet
 Materials: cover stock paper, colored pencils, glue stick, jumbo craft stick
 Preparation: Run off craft 15 on cover stock paper.
 Instructions: Color the Roman soldier. Cut it out and glue it to a jumbo craft stick.

• <u>Game:</u> Variation of "Duck, Duck, Goose" Instructions: As a reminder that Jesus healed those who had faith, play a variation of "Duck, Duck, Goose" by substituting the words "sick, sick, healed"

JOURNAL

The daily journal is included in the booklet for the students to complete at home. It has six poetic readings and related Bible verses. It would be beneficial for the teacher to read through and be familiar with its content.
